

Letter to Mary Johnson and Caroline Griswold of Worthington, Ohio from Elizabeth Beckwith of Somerset, Ohio, July 26, 1840

Subject: A school friend of Mary's and Caroline (Cal) Griswold wants them both to visit her in Somerset; Miss Tucker still in Somerset

[Handwritten note, script]

Dear Mary

It is with much pleasure I received your kind letter and was glad to hear from you although I have not answered it. Think not dear Mary I have forgotten you no Mary I will never forget you and C. and the many pleasant hours we have spent together

I have nothing new to communicate Miss Tucker is still hear [sic] and I believe will remain hear [sic] sometime the people like her very much Indeed she has been at two partys [sic] since she was hear [sic]

Oh, I tell you what we have [joyful] times hear, [sic] I have a great deal of fun I must not write you so much I want to make Caroline laugh. Give my love to all the folk Miss McNeal in particular and take share of it yourself

When are you a coming to Somerset do come soon

Dear Cal

I must give you a word of constulation [sic] for you sayd [sic] you was down hearted will you laugh you must wether [sic] you will or not I have no news for you only to say that our hen hatched to [sic] little chickens this morning and when they get bigger I will invite you over to spend the afternoon



Do come to Somerset fi [sic] you can't com [sic] any other way we have got a calf if you will send for ti [sic] you may hitch it in [sic] your sley [sic] and come
