George Harding, our president-elect, met with several of the members of the class to arrange for the coming hayride. This was one of the most important outings of the year and proved a tremendous success. Another of the magazine sales for the sophomores was given, and a rather large sum was collected. At the close of the term, the annual class picnic was held at Eckle's Lake with swimming and entertainment for all.

The president of the junior class was Don Russell. A committee was selected to choose class rings. Later in the year, we opened our football concession stand with Mrs. Mayall as advisor. 
The Heischman-coached basketball squads, over an eight-year period, have a record which is hard to match.

This year Mr. Hittepole coached the Freshman basketball team and in the spring he took over the job of track coach.



The main purpose of the club is to keep contact with all lettermen of the high school and alumni and to encourage more games with alumni and faculty.


