

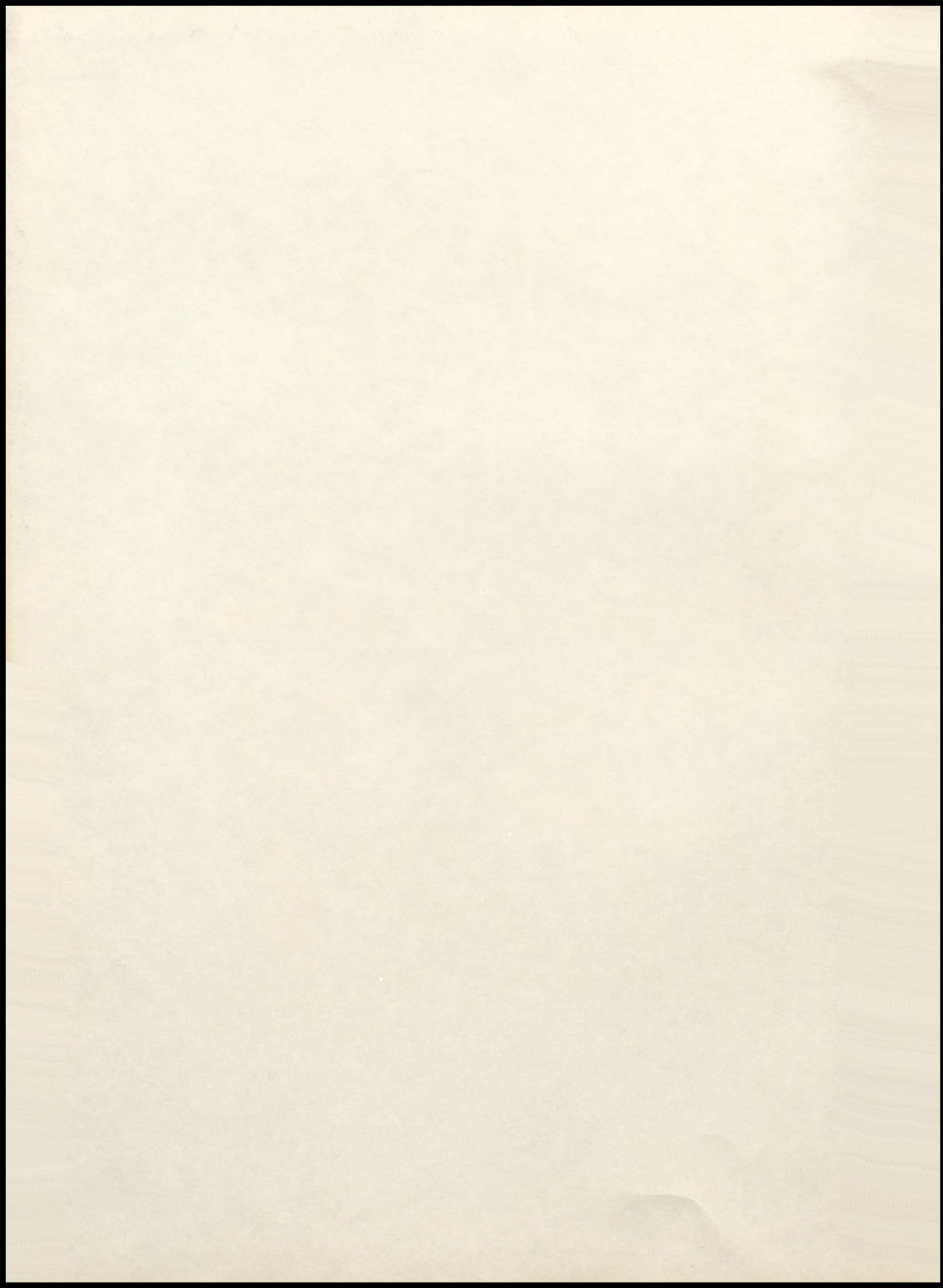

YEARS OF CHANGE

Graduating in 1942 with 66 students, Florence "Boots" Snowden Pruden, grandmother of Senior Todd and Junior Wendy, has observed major changes at WHS

The biggest change that has occurred in the Worthington community is the population. "Worthington used to be just a little tiny village bounded by Evening, Morning, North, and South Streets," explains Pruden. "Everyone knew everyone. It was just a nice, little town." Students from 4 elementaries filtered into the high school, today's Annex; then, the main campus was a cornfield.

The class of '42 had few traditions. The rock and wall didn't exist, nor did senior privileges or the mascot. They did have a major rivalry, not with Upper Arlington as we do today, but with Westerville. "I still don't feel too friendly with Westerville," states Pruden with a chuckle in her voice.

The drastic changes in the diversity of staff and students from 1942 to present day are many. Pruden feels that today's students are under more pressure, but they also have more opportunities. "Current students have so many more choices in subjects and courses of study than we did, but I don't know if they enjoy school as much as I did. From what I can see, Todd and Wendy work a lot harder academically than I ever did."

In 1941, Worthington High School offered only three major sports, all solely for boys. Football, basketball, and baseball filled their year with activity; girls joined clubs to keep themselves busy. G.A.A., Girls Athletic Association, held intramural games but functioned more as a social club.

The place to hang-out during the 40's was Don Birnie's Drug Store. Kids flocked there after football and basketball games; during open lunch (yes, the school had an open lunch policy in 1941), the groups would gather at Birnie's for sodas.

Casual "going out" in the 40's was also different than it is today. The guys gave their girls class rings and Hi-Y pins while the girls gave guys G.A.A pins.

Although some changes have occurred, weekend fun has remained the same. In the '40's students attended football and basketball games, danced in the gym, ice skated on the river, and attended movies. They, too, looked forward to the Jr.-Sr. Prom which was held at Brookside Country Club. When they had access to cars, they would drive around, much like today's students do when they are "hanging out."

Mr. Bruce Baxter, father of sophomore Megan, played basketball when he attended W.H.S. Following in her father's footsteps, Megan just concluded a successful season playing as a forward on the Junior Varsity team. Recently, Mr. Baxter recalled a fond memory of his high school years.

Baxter remembers distinctly his P.O.D. teacher, Mr. Nuskin. This classroom of seniors was notorious for teasing their teacher. They called him "nutty," left peanut shells on the chalk tray, and drew pictures of nuts on the blackboard. Each day Mr. Nuskin would begin class by erasing all the pictures and throwing away the shells. "I don't think it bothered him, our calling him 'nutty.' It was good natured fun. He just ignored us," Baxter says with a chuckle in his voice.

One day Mr. Nuskin was absent from school so the class had a substitute teacher. During lunch a student went home, changed into a three piece suit, and returned with a briefcase. Playing the role of Mr. Nuskin's student teacher by the name of Mr. Nutter, he walked into the class. The substitute fell for the ploy, believing the story, and agreed to have Mr. Nutter teach the class. Everyone thought the student had pulled off the biggest prank of the year until the sub commented to the principal that Mr. Nuskin's student teacher was very impressive. Later, the principal realized that the building had no student teachers assigned for that quarter. Eventually the student was caught, but he didn't get into any serious trouble. "Everyone thought it was hilarious," Baxter insists.

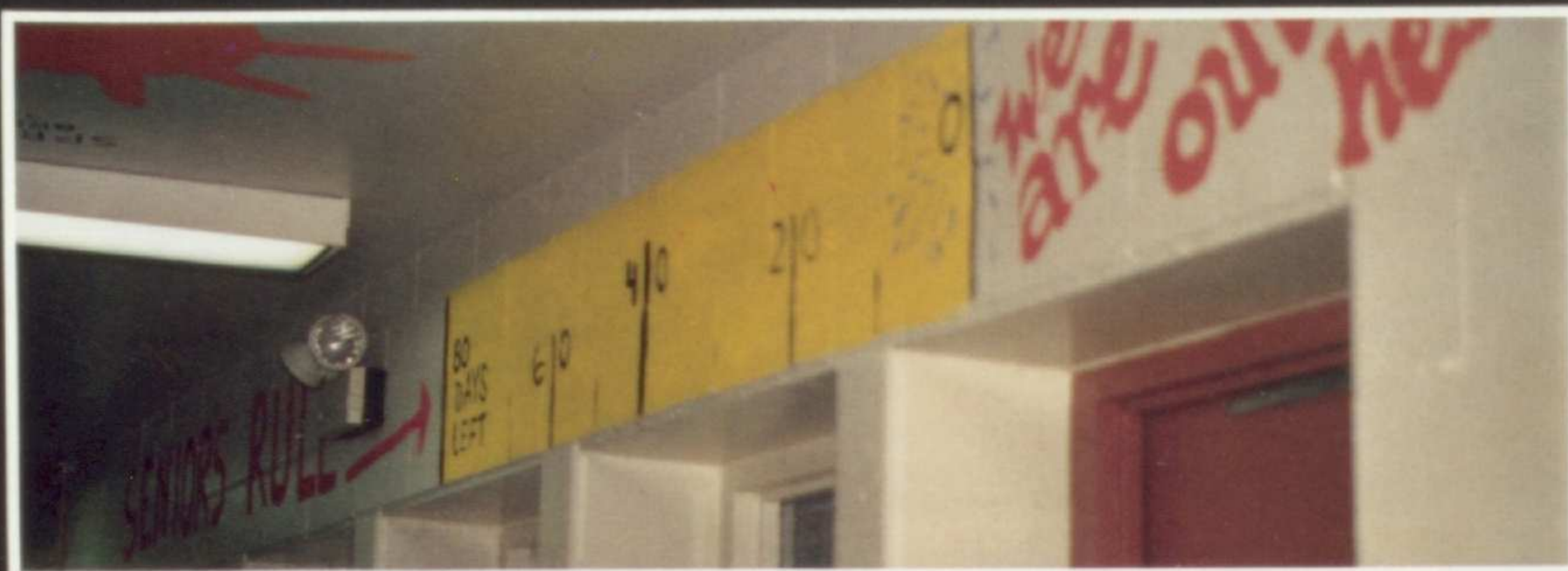
RENOVATIONS

June 6, 1990, marks the beginning of the renovations for the high school facilities. The demolition of the west end of main campus will be the first step. New athletic facilities will fill this space. The old gym will be redesigned into a new library, and the existing auxiliary gym will become classrooms. All of the classrooms will be arranged by subjects within the same areas. The administrative offices will extend to Kilbourne, closing it as a student facility. Linworth will also undergo renovations.

Other changes will follow as well. The parking lot to which students and staff are so accustomed will be completely altered. Plans call for a new entrance for the staff at the annex, while students will enter by way of Seabury Drive. The old parking entrance will be used as a drop-off area only.

By voting for these renovations through a bond issue, the Worthington community has supported plans that will ensure comparable schools at main campus and Hard Road.

CONSTRUCTION

The last bond issue also funded the construction of a second high school. Throughout the past one and a half years, administrator, staff, and students have been planning for the changes involving two schools.

One of the most difficult challenges facing those who are opening a new school is beginning traditions that establish the school's character. "Traditions are a hard thing to change . . ." but Ron Porta, the recently named principal of the new high school, hopes this won't be too big a challenge when building spirit and unique traditions for the new school on Hard Road. Mr. Porta has identified his "most important goal as one that will continue at the old Worthington High School as well." He wants

all those associated with the new school to be "proud to attend a Worthington school and proud to learn in a positive environment where the students know all the staff and feel comfortable about being in school." This, however, is the only tradition that Porta will borrow. "Those who are opening the new school will have to make up all the other traditions." The staff along with students will get to choose the colors, crest, mascot, and even the school song. "The new student body will abandon many main campus traditions: no wall, no rock, and no Hall of Fame will be waiting at the new school. The future traditions are in their hearts and hands. What will they be?

ATHLETIC CHANGES

Students are anticipating the many changes occurring at the school with great enthusiasm and interest. During the winter of 1989, the athletic department along with the school administration unveiled incredible athletic facilities to accommodate both high schools. The changes to come will allow more competitive sporting events, a possible intramural program, and increased overall student sports participation.

Both schools will house a competitive main gym seating 2,000 spectators at a home basketball game. This gym also boasts two full courts of basketball running perpendicular to the game floor. Additionally, the main gyms at both schools will be able to seat the entire student body on one side so all students will face one direction during assemblies.

One of the most exciting changes affecting the new school and the remodeling of main campus is the addition of the spacious auxiliary gyms. Both schools will contain this huge addition that includes four full basketball courts. The size of the gym will allow practice time to be less constraining and hurried. Twenty-four baskets, mobile dividing curtains, and spacious floors allow several concurrent practices. Gymnastics, tennis, wrestling, volleyball, baseball, even golf can practice on the synthetic floors of the auxiliary gyms.

Also included in the renovations and construction of the respective high schools are contemporary weight and training rooms. These facilities along with flexible locker layouts will make the two Worthington high schools the most contemporary in the area.

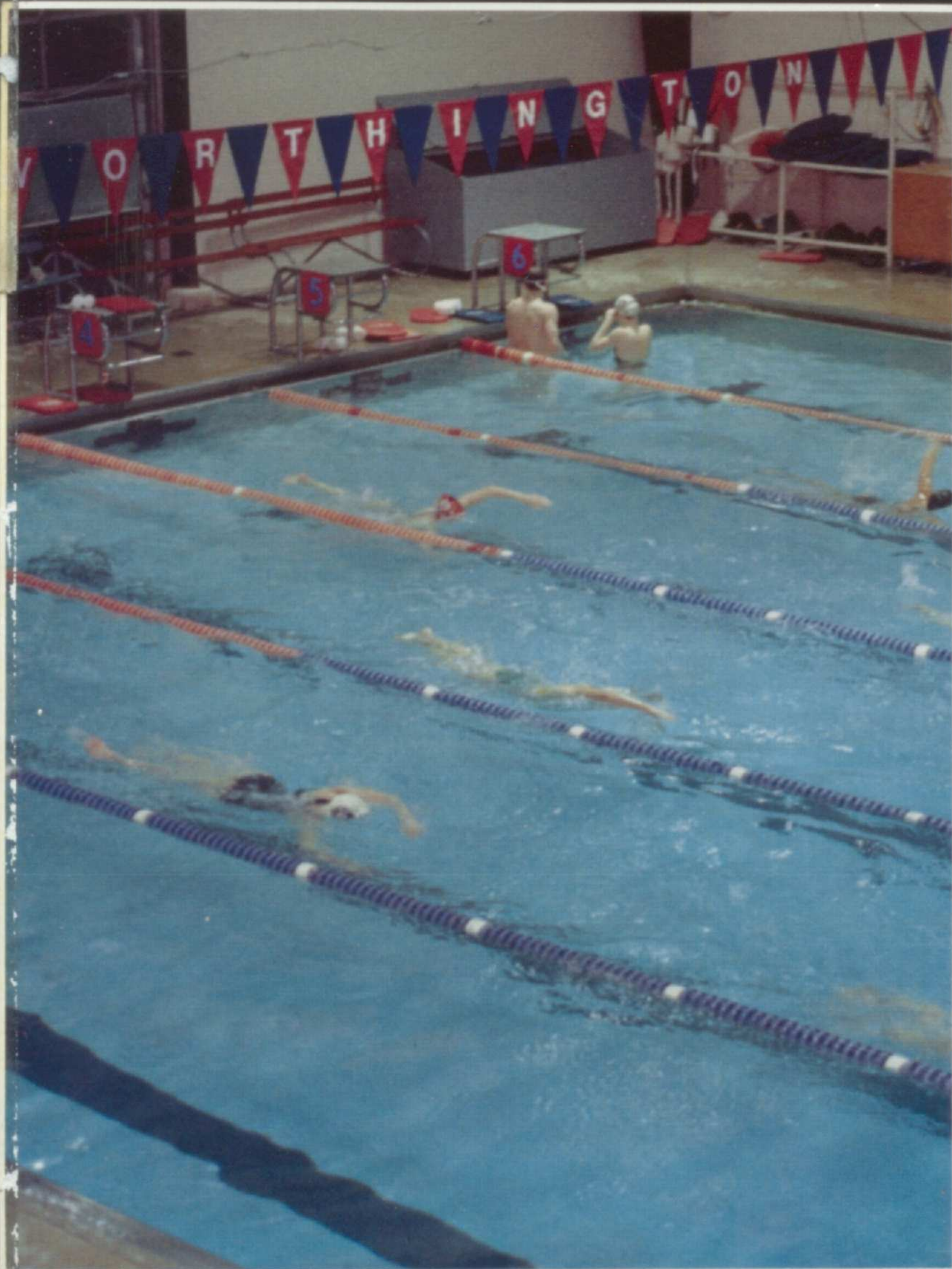

Major Changes Awaited

Major revisions and developments caused by the addition of the new high school will change the face of the Athletic Department. Athletic Director Dr. Richard Seils believes that Worthington does have a solid program at the present time and expects it to continue after the division of the district. He also hopes that the Athletic Department will still be responsive to the needs of the students with added interscholastic sophomore teams and a possible intramural program.

For the first couple of years, Dr. Seils ensures that the athletic programs at both high schools will be comparable with measures taken to assure equality. Links will be made through interaction between team captains and parent support groups of both schools. "But as the years pass and unique interests develop, the schools will take on their own personalities and offer different athletic programs," Dr. Seils adds.

The process of designating coaching and administrative positions, a concern of the Athletic Department, will parallel the process of placing teachers. Surveys to the faculty and district staff will assess interests as new applicants are generated.

With the addition of Dublin, Marysville, and Watkins Memorial, and the new Worthington school, the Ohio Capital Conference will reorganize into three divisions. The smallest eight schools will fill one division with the remaining twelve being split into the other two divisions. To prevent a bitter rivalry, our two schools will maintain separate athletic programs.

"Although the division of the school does include the athletic department, we will make every effort to continue the traditions of Worthington sports and to reach out to as many students willing to participate as possible," Dr. Seils assures.

Swimmers waded through another grueling workout during practice in the natatorium. Both high schools will share this facility unless an independent group of citizens organizes a campaign to fund a new natatorium.

TOWARDS THE 21st CENTURY

With the 21st Century just a decade away, students will witness great changes in schools, teaching, and the entire educational process itself. The advancements in technology will force teachers to change curriculum and teaching methods.

As the symbolic head of the educated journey to the 21st Century, President Bush believes that changes are necessary to accommodate the future. He understands the advancements in technology demand a stronger science and math background. He also acknowledges the strong possibility of having computers at almost every facet of the student's educational development.

"I think we'll see more departments and courses using the computer," states Mrs. Robin Charles, the WHS computer aide. "Now, the computer labs are used regularly only by the English department, but even

in the next few years, more and more departments will begin to use them." Mrs. Charles also projects that computers will enter the classroom in the near future with more programs available in a teaching context. "The goal is to use the computer alongside and even directly with the overhead projectors and blackboard."

The science department chair, Mrs. Frauke Palmer speculates on the future of science, saying, "Understanding it will be much more important to everyone." She continues, "Also, the need for more scientists in the world will cause a greater push for developing a suitable science program to prepare our students." Mrs. Palmer believes the science requirement will increase and the kind of science taught will change to emphasize the explanation of problems and the uses of science. She adds, "A change in the K-12

system is required to accommodate more science teaching earlier in the students' development."

Heading towards the 21st century, the WHS National Merit Finalists have plans to succeed in the new century. Brett Horn is preparing for the advanced world with plans to major in Civil Engineering at Purdue University while Mike Hart has future plans in chemistry. Other Finalists, however, have pursuits outside of math and science. Bryan Bowen is enrolling in the honors program at Ohio State University with a planned major in history. Ohio University is the school of Dave Wendt's choice, and he plans to pursue a political science/pre-law major.

The society of the 21st century will indeed be more complex and diversified, and the students and staff of WHS will make the changes accordingly.

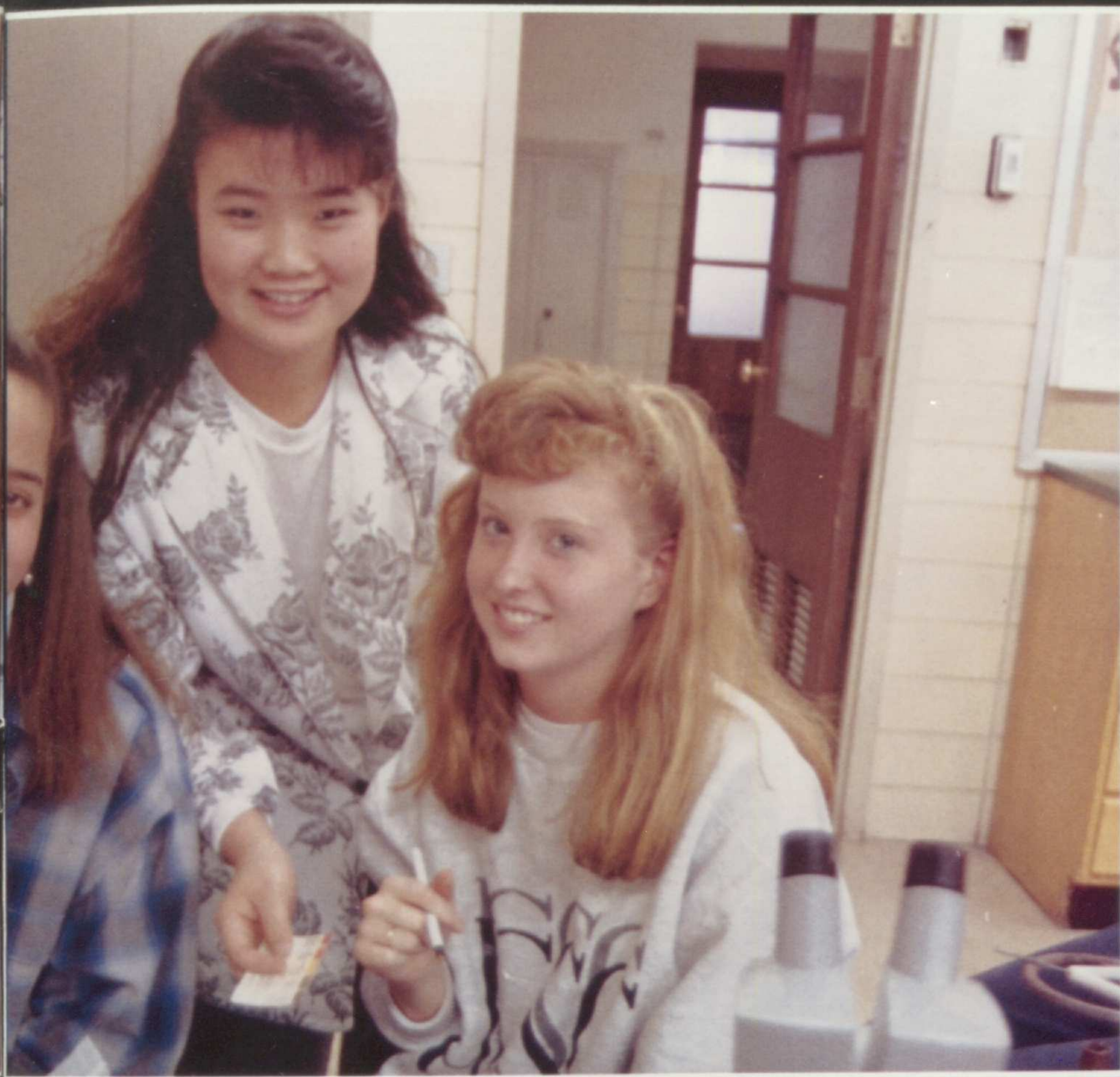

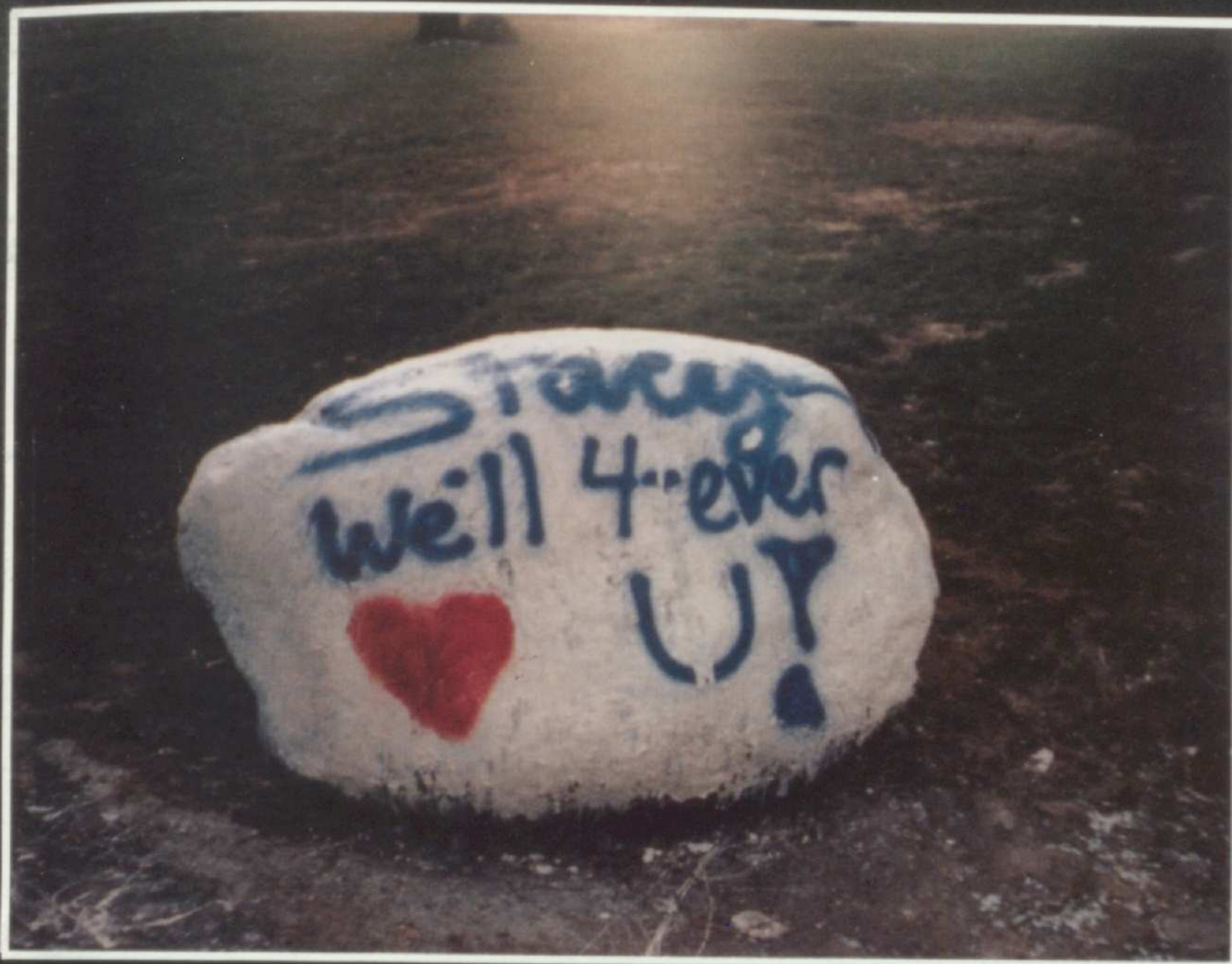

A DAY OF MOURNING

December 4, 1989 ... a very sad day. Silence hung in the air as hardly no one talked. A sense of sadness hung over WHS. I could smell the fear, hurt, and anger and taste the sadness and agony that so many were feeling. I could see the waterfall of tears of others as I looked through my own. When I walked through the halls, I wasn't treated as an outsider but as part of one big family. Many hugs and words were given, not sarcastic or harsh remarks, but remarks of love and kindness. There was no way to describe how each person felt because even people who did not know Stacy were expressing different kinds of emotion. People walked around like they didn't know where they were coming from or where they were going. I don't think the lives of the people who were her good friends or her acquaintances or those who just saw her around the school will ever be the same again. The whole family of WHS was changed. December 1, 1989, was the day we lost a member of our family.

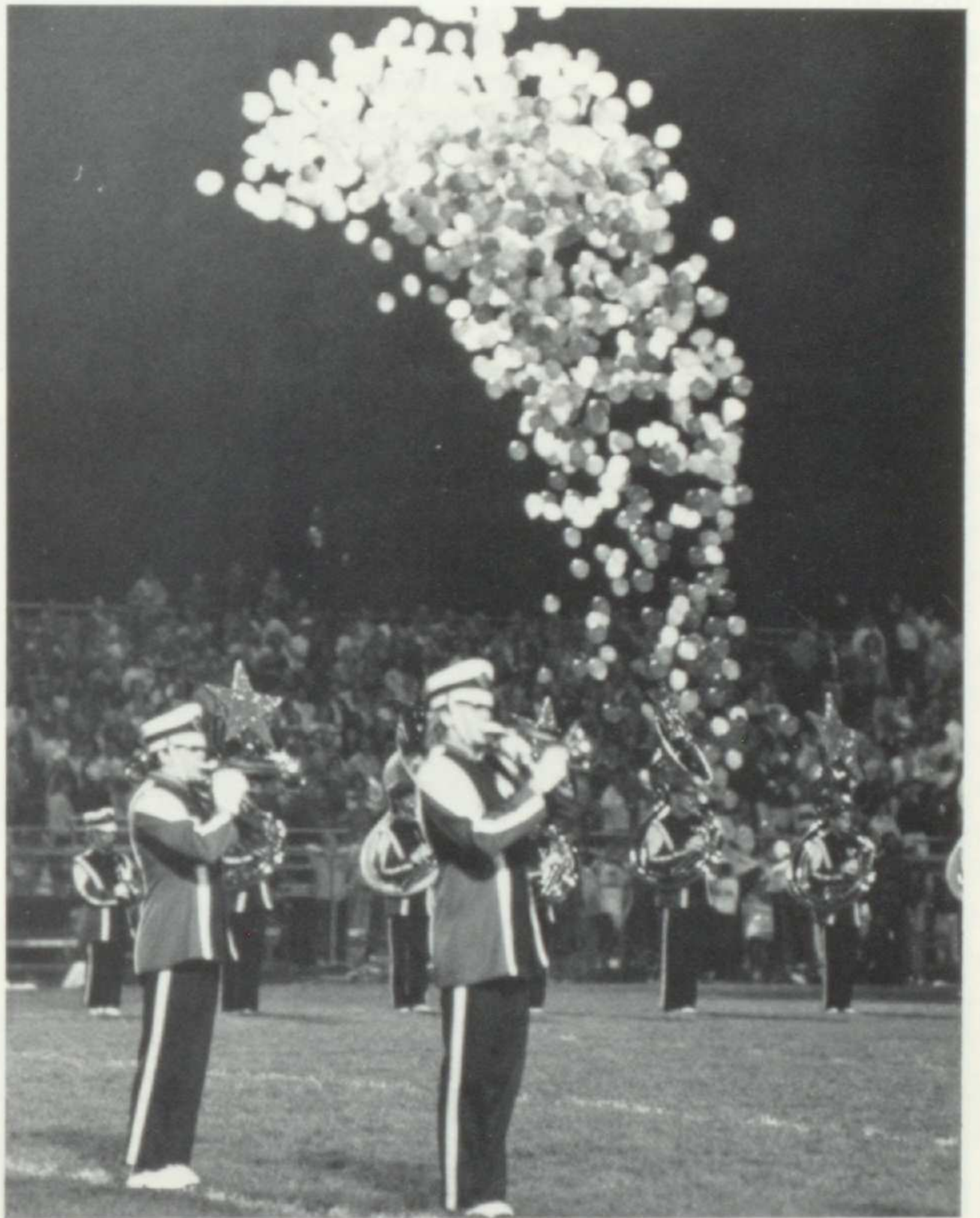
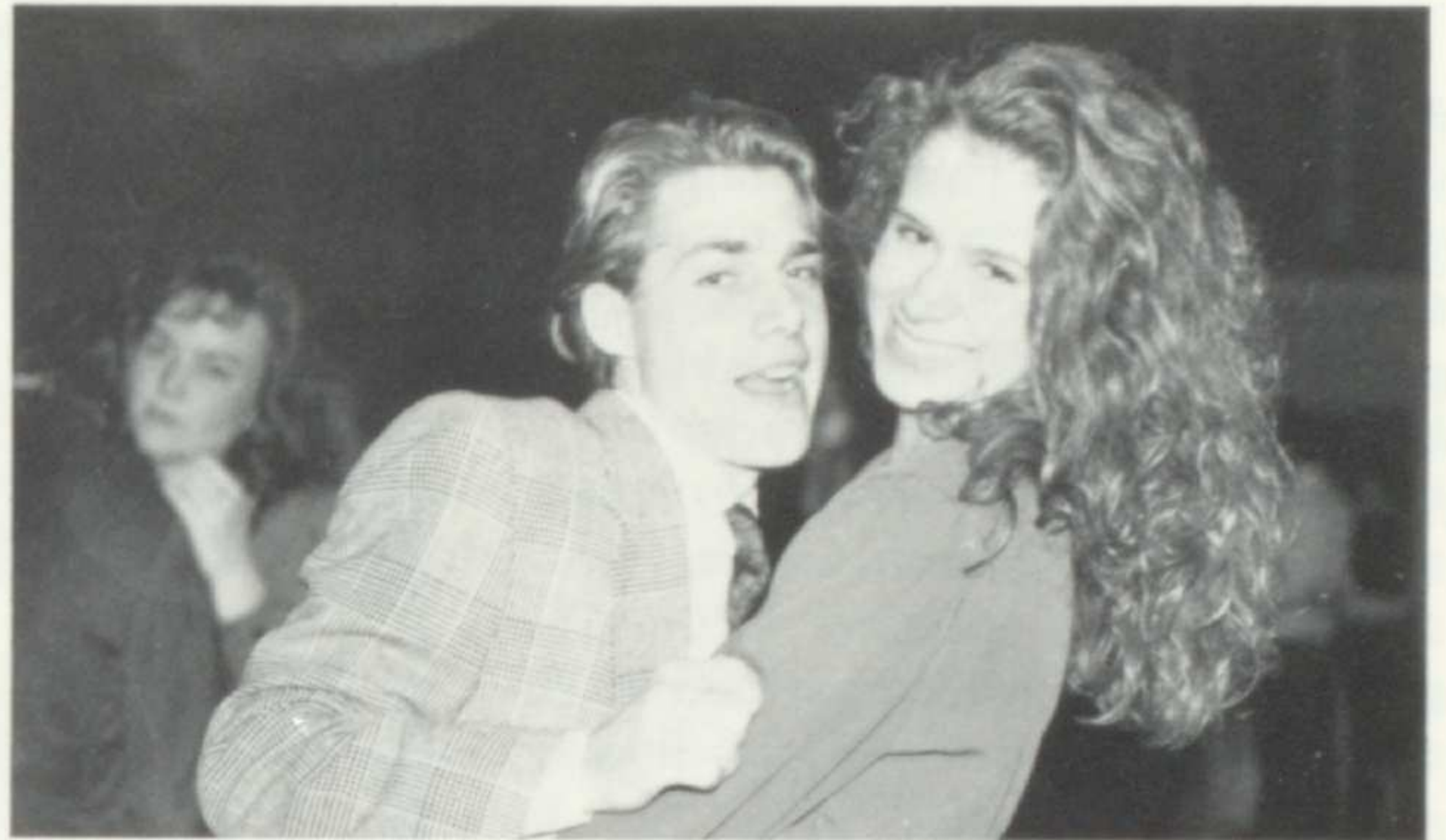

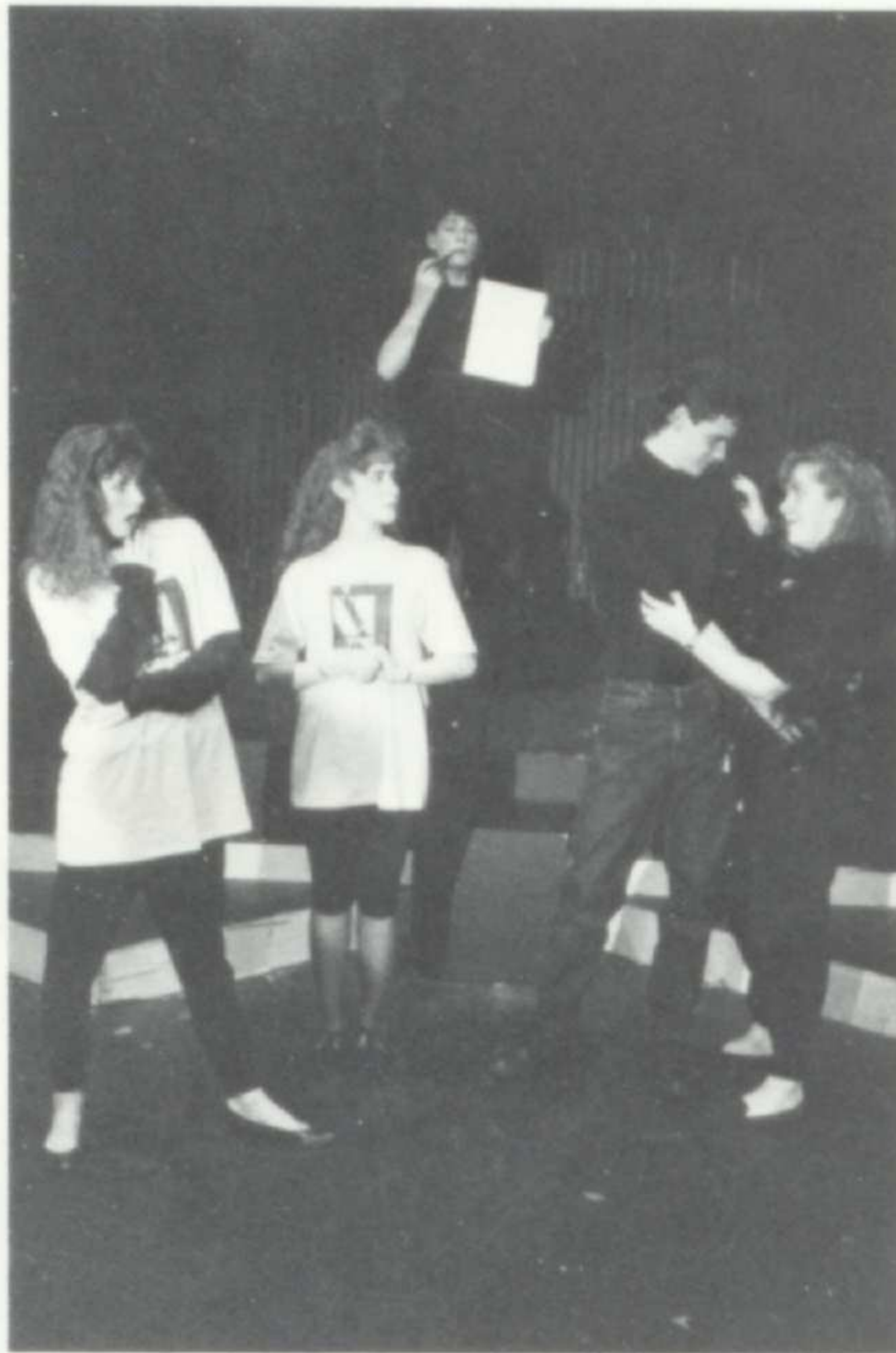
FALL PLAY

LITTLE

SHOP OF HORRORS

The famous farce of all American musical comedies called LITTLE SHOP OF HORRORS was the Theatre Repertory's next production. Each scene of the play was highlighted by various musical scores performed by cast members including Aly Horne (Audrey), Bryce Kasson (Seymour), Mike Musick (the voice of Audrey II), Jennie Printz and Johanna Smith (Chiffon), Abra Bush and Jenny Chilcoat (Crystal), and Paige Taylor, and Andrea Trask (Ronnnette).

LITTLE SHOP OF HORRORS is a musical comedy about a bloodthirsty plant grown by Seymour Krelbourne. Seymour lives in a skid row flower shop owned by a man named Mr. Mushnik (Andrew Warner). Also working at the flower shop is Seymour's dream girl, Audrey. Audrey manages to shatter all of Seymour's hopes of true love by dating Orin Scrivello (Bryan Hartig), a sadistic dentist who travels by motorcycle. Seymour begins to win the heart of Audrey by naming his new and wonderful plant after her, calling it Audrey II. After realizing that Audrey II will only grow by eating blood, Seymour feeds it regularly from his fingertips. As the plant becomes larger and larger, Seymour becomes more and more famous. While dealing with his rising fame, Seymour worries over the amount of "food" Audrey II requires; he also learns that the plant has the ability to talk. Instead of dealing with Audrey II's constant begging, Seymour goes to the local dentist's office to kill Orin Scrivello; much to Seymour's luck, the dentist's gas mask locks to Orin's head and asphyxiates him. Seymour then rushes the body back to Audrey II, leaving a trail of blood behind him. The next morning Mr. Mushnik confronts Seymour about the stains left on the floor and about the death of Orin Scrivello. Seymour manages to save himself by backing Mushnik into the plant's jaws, thus providing it with another meal. Seymour is overwhelmed with the desire to kill the plant and put an end to its power. While Seymour is out, Audrey comes to the flower shop and the now-giant plant engulfs her. Seymour saves her, but on her request, he feeds Audrey to Audrey II. Seymour then tries to kill the plant, but the plant eats him first.

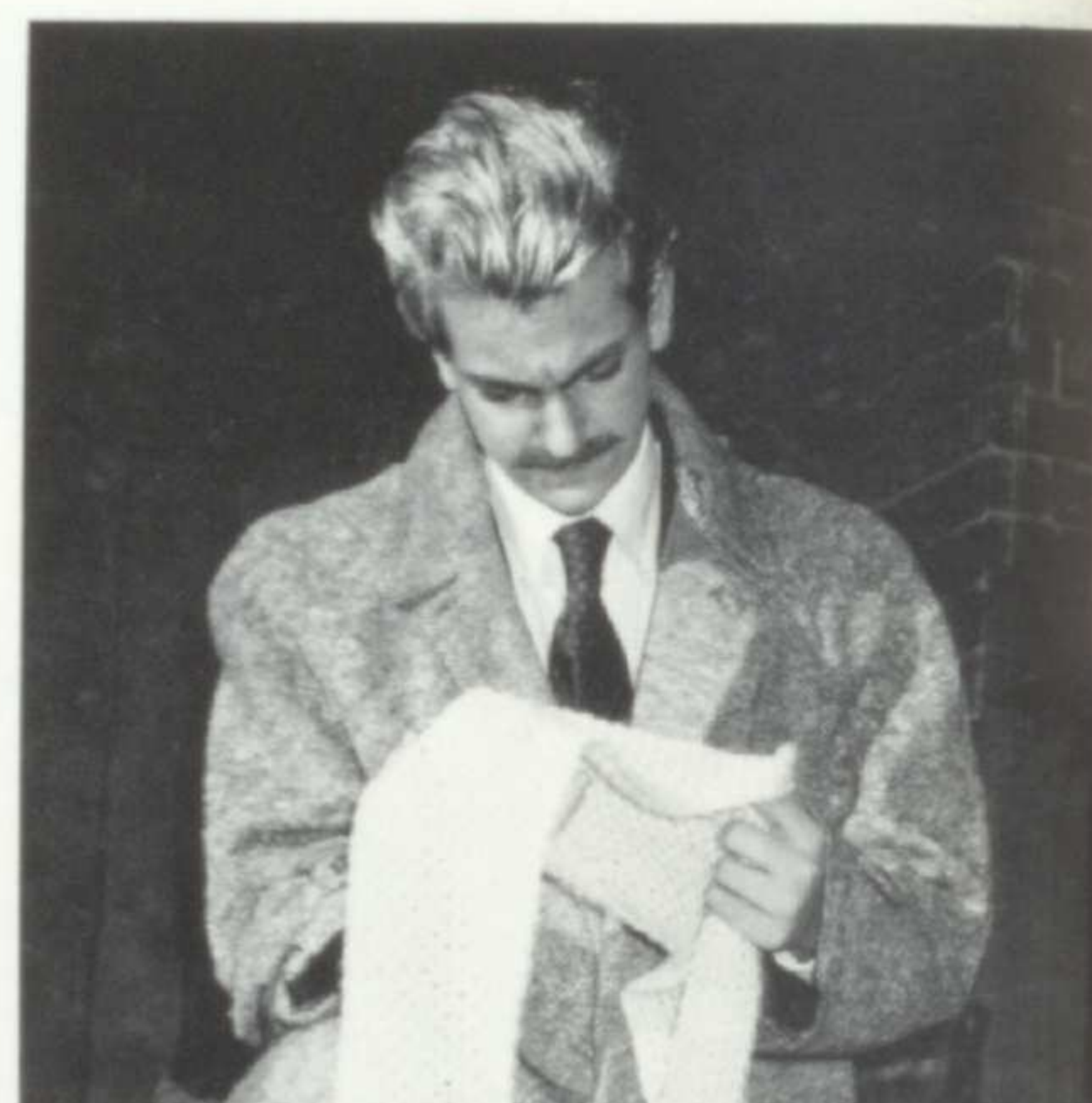

One day in the early 1900's, Molly informs her father, Shamus Tobin (Scott Stokes), that she wants to leave for "that place they call Denver" to find love and wealth. She makes it to Leadville, Colorado, where she goes to work in the Saddle Rock Saloon for Christmas Morgan (Bryan Hartig). There she meets her future husband Johnny "Leadville" Brown (Andrew Warner), the best known miner in town. After a month of chasing Molly, Johnny convinces her that he is worthy of marrying her. Johnny manages to strike it rich and takes Molly to the high society class of Denver. When she invites herself to Mrs. McGlone's

(Meredith Lair) dinner party, Molly quickly discovers that money alone is not what it takes to achieve high society status; it takes education and manners which Molly and Johnny just don't have. By turning the party into a religious frenzy, Molly does, however, make one friend, Father Ryan (Carl Graf). Molly knows she "isn't down yet;" her next decision is to learn to read and write, in hopes of becoming a part of high society Denver. Molly and Johnny spend two years in Paris where Molly learns to speak different languages and becomes acquainted with many dignitaries including Prince DeLong (Stephan Thompson) and Princess DeLong (Aly Horne). When Johnny decides that he's tired of Europe, Molly agrees to return to Denver with her important European friends. When they throw a party mixing high class Denver society with their

Leadville friends, the whole night becomes a disaster. A well known Denver journalist, Malcolm Broderick (Jeremy Rice) quotes Molly using profanity and slander, driving Molly back to Europe and Johnny back to Leadville. As the years go by, Molly becomes closer to her royal friends, especially Prince DeLong. One evening at a night club in France the Prince proposes to Molly, but in turning him down, Molly realizes how much she needs Johnny. For once she really is "down." When Molly takes *The Titanic* back to the U.S., she earns her title "Unsinkable" by not giving up while stranded in a life raft in the middle of the Atlantic. Even the Denver society proclaims Molly a hero for keeping up morale and saving the other victims in the life raft. The play closes with Molly and Johnny reuniting.

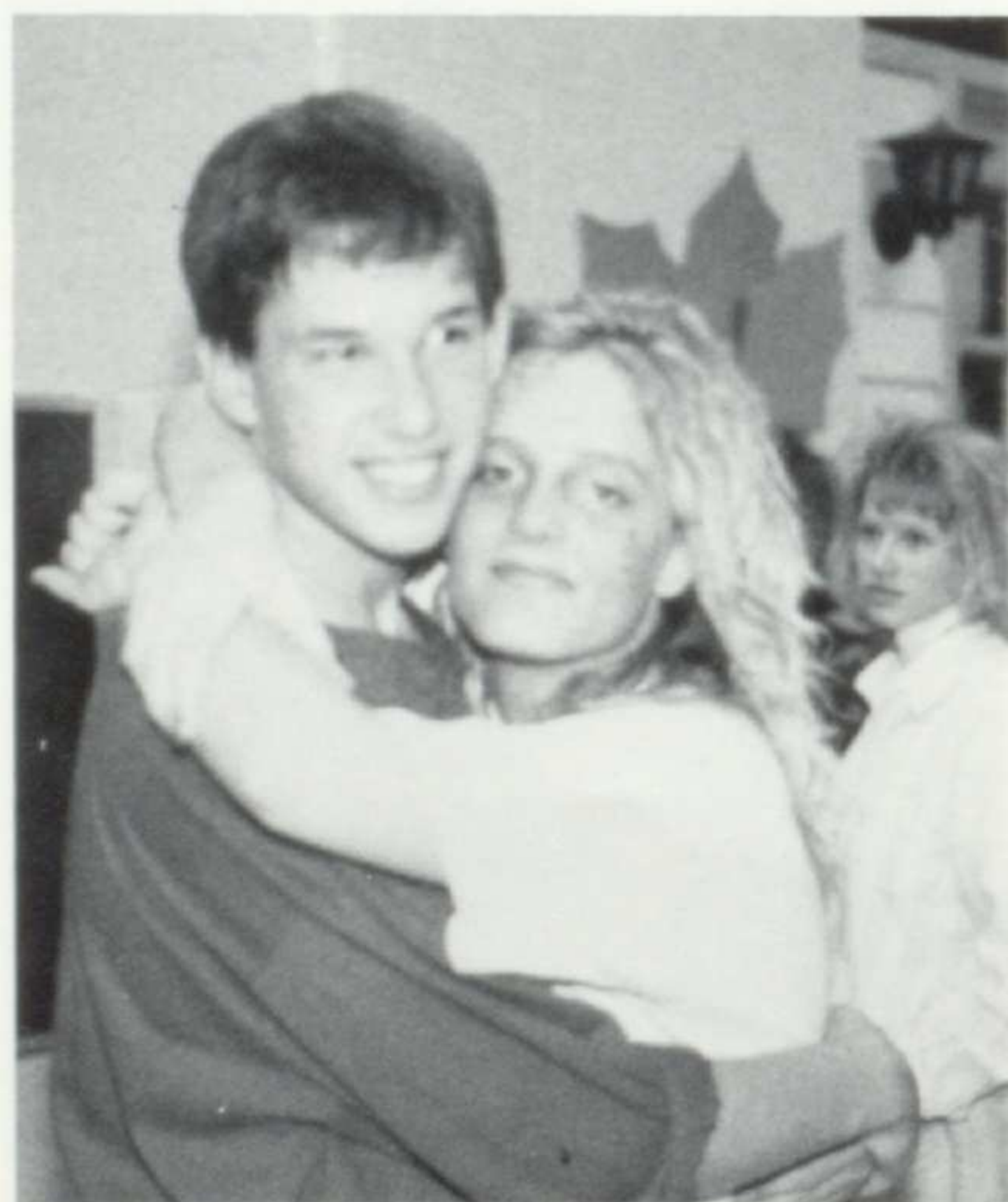
HOLLY HOP

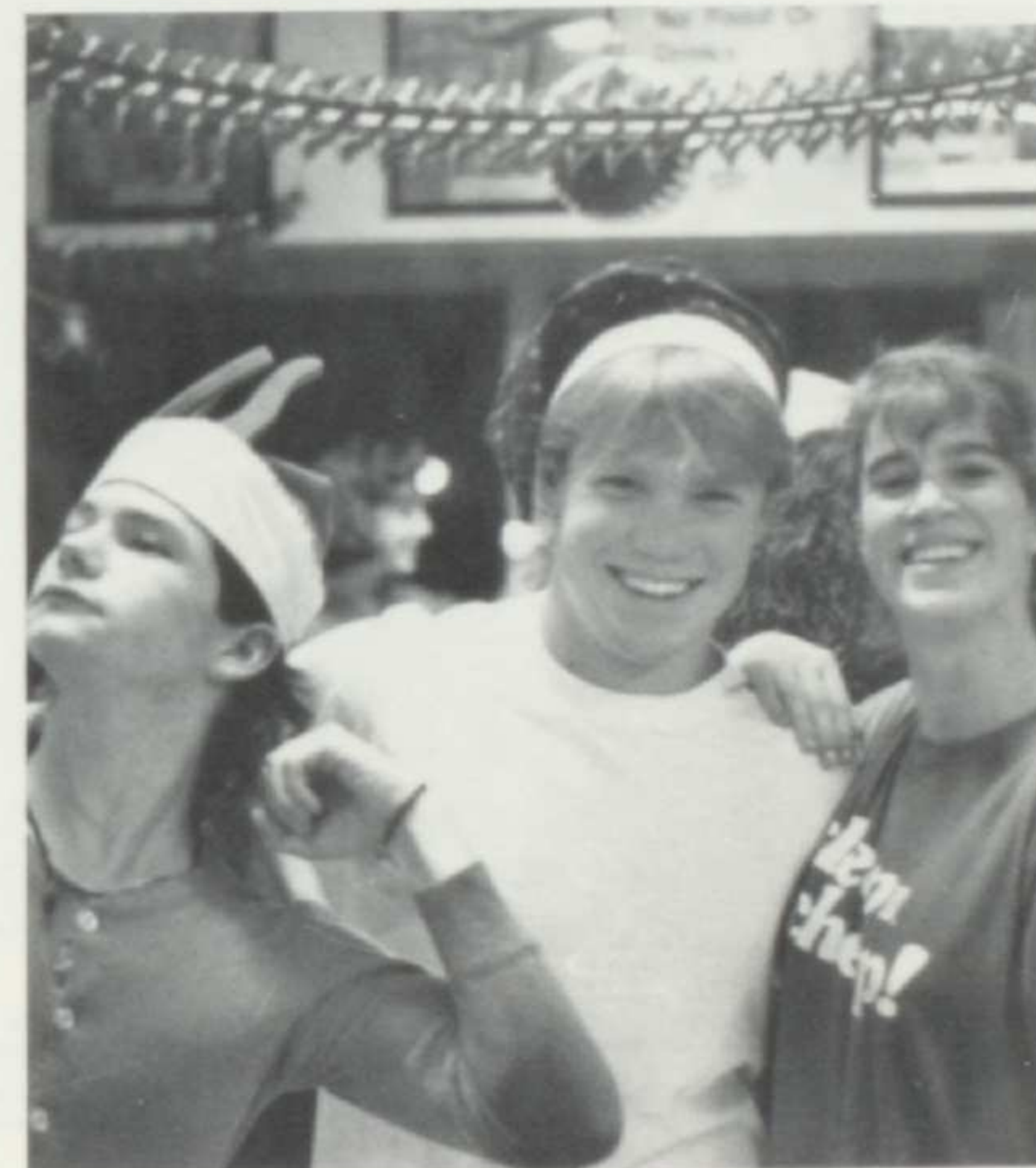

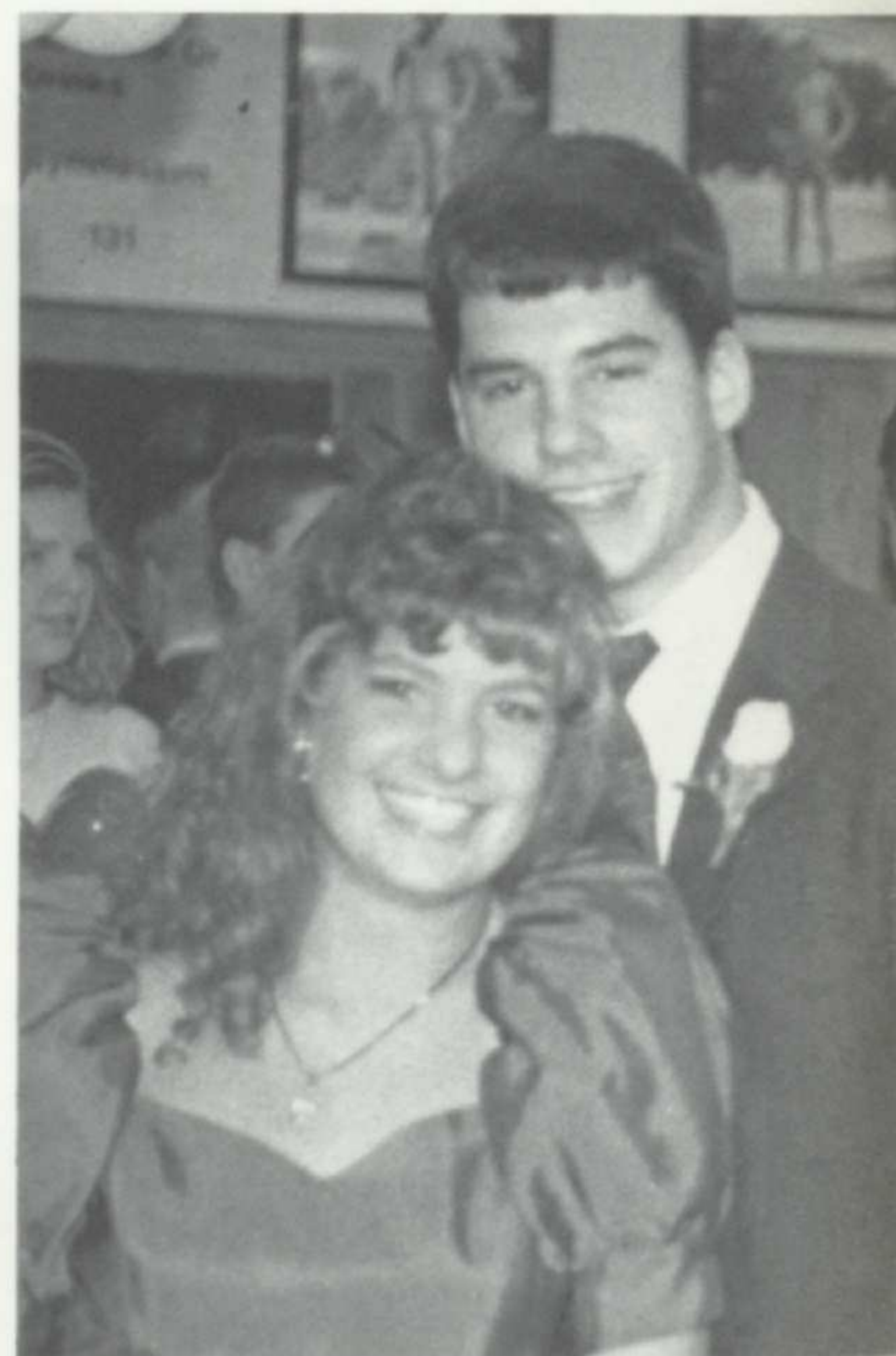

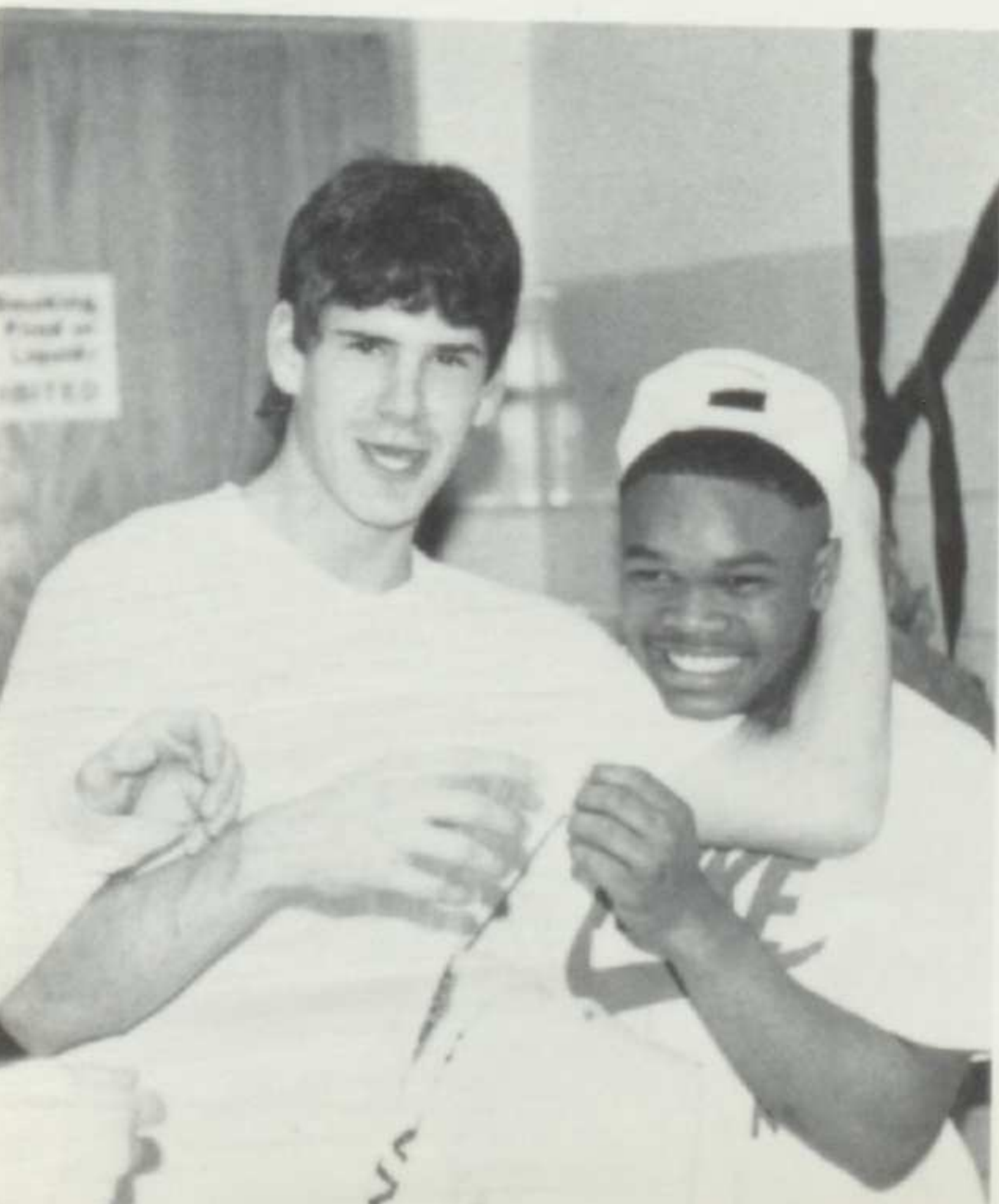
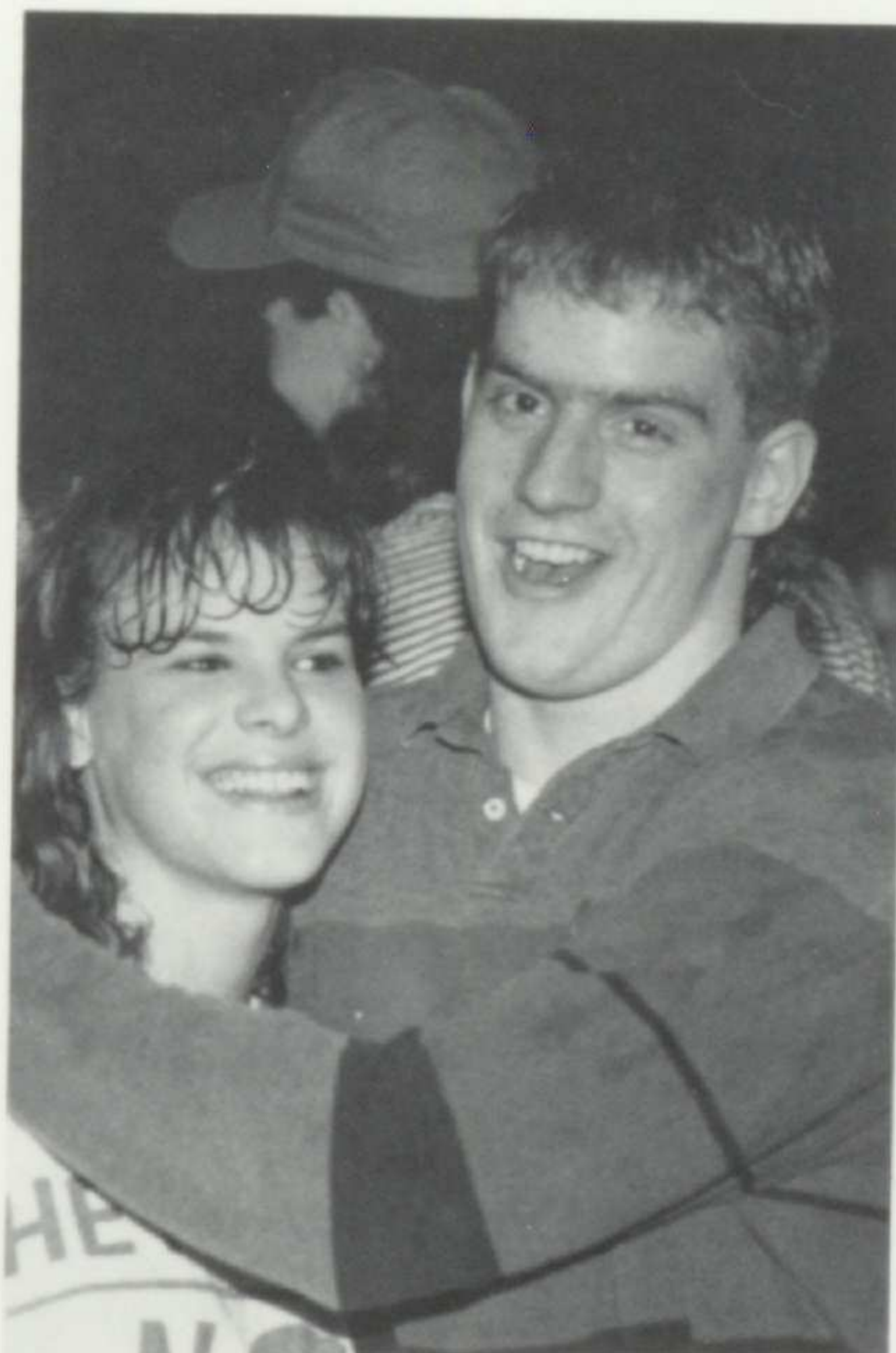


KARDS Dance

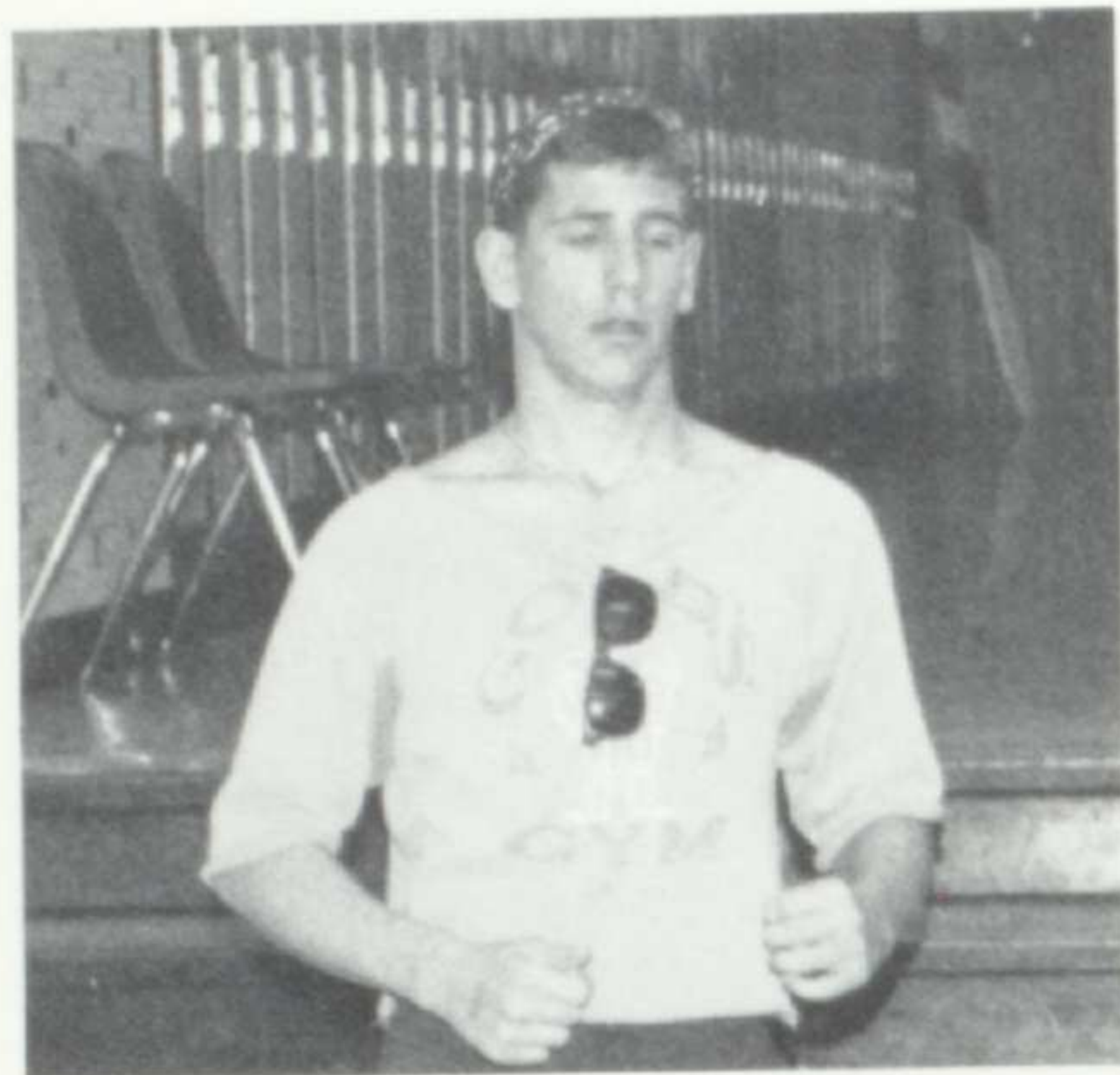

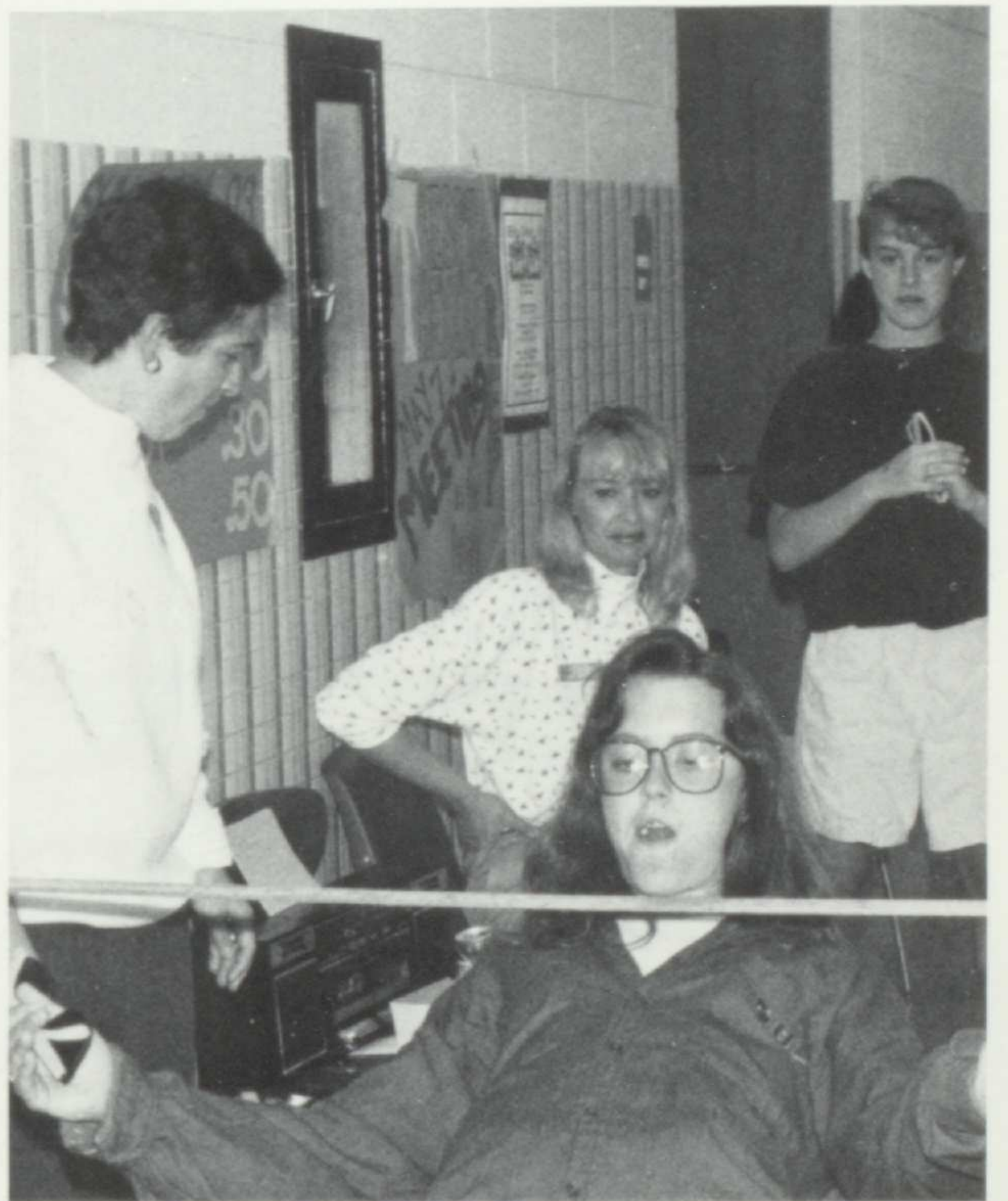

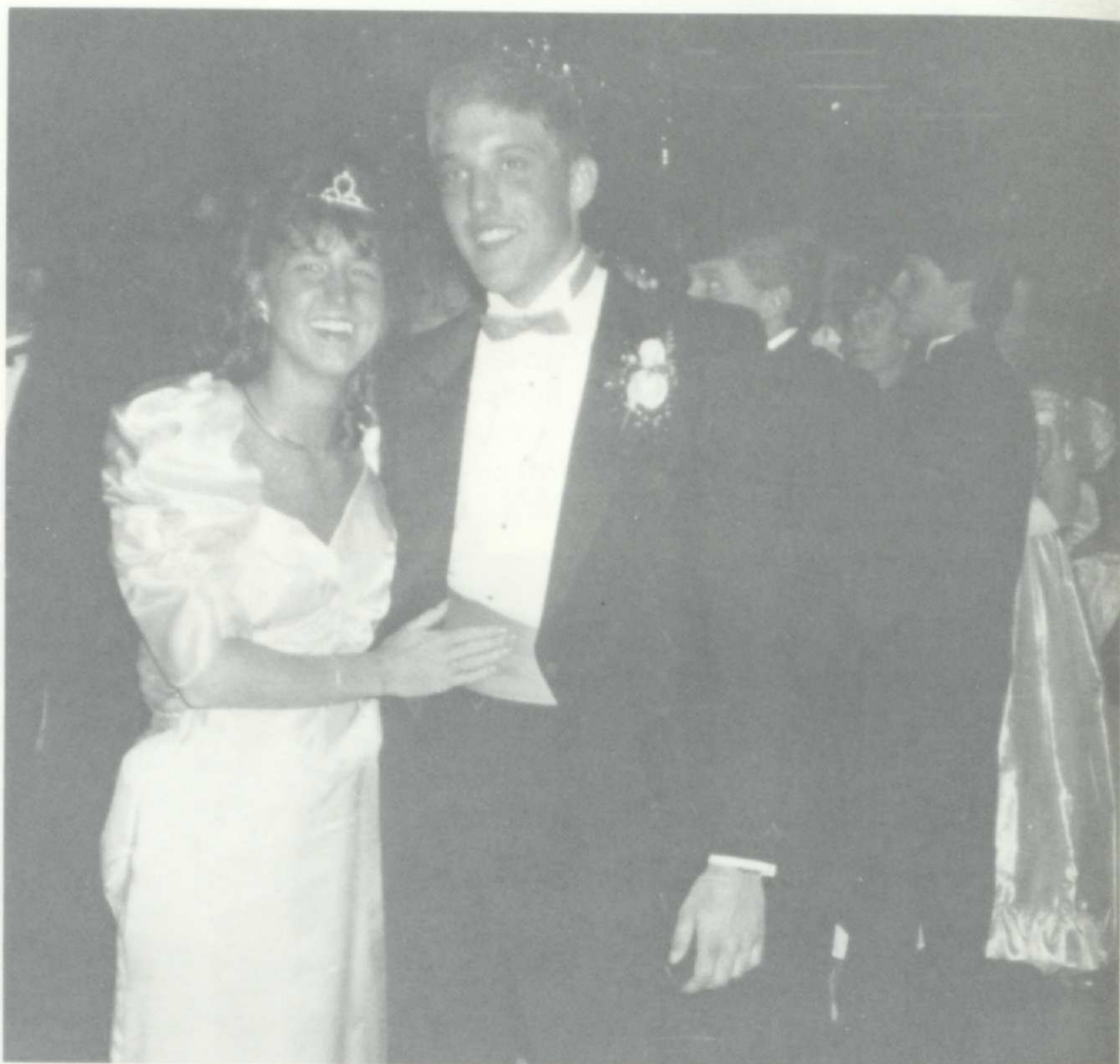
A NIGHT IN HEAVEN

The recent tradition of Prom King and Queen was continued. Around 9:15, the crowns went to King Dave Hughes and Queen Jenni Jones.

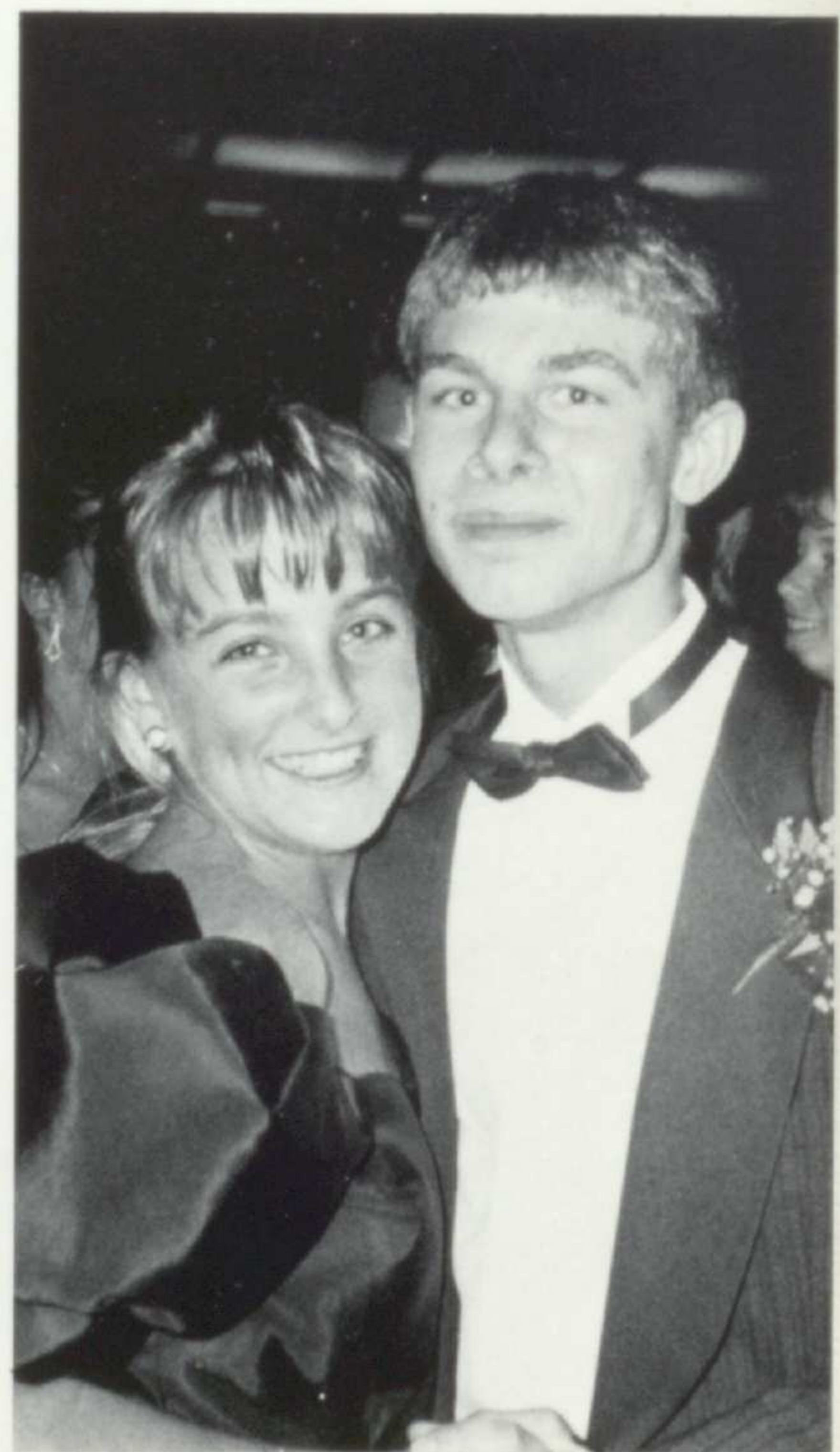

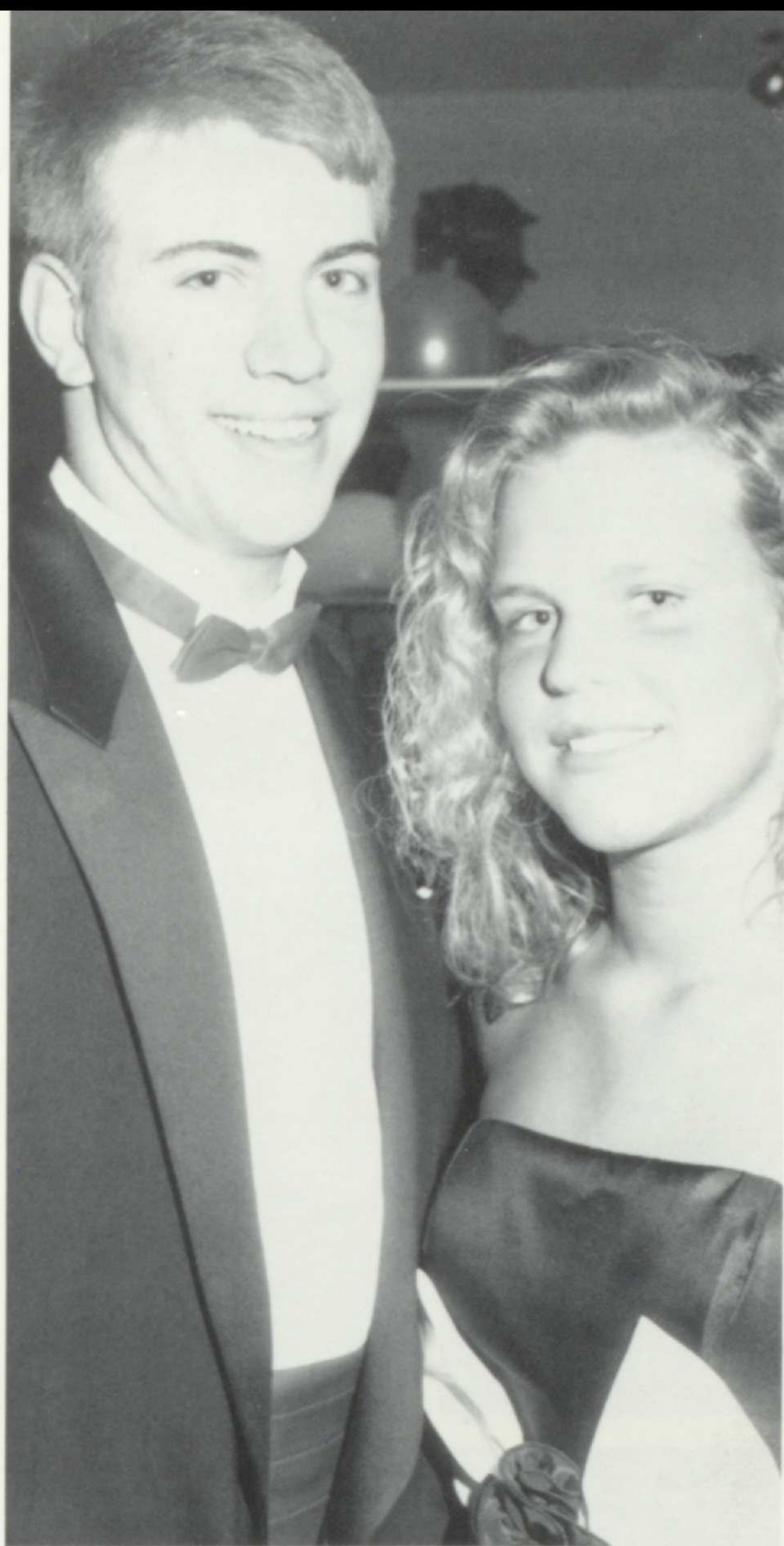

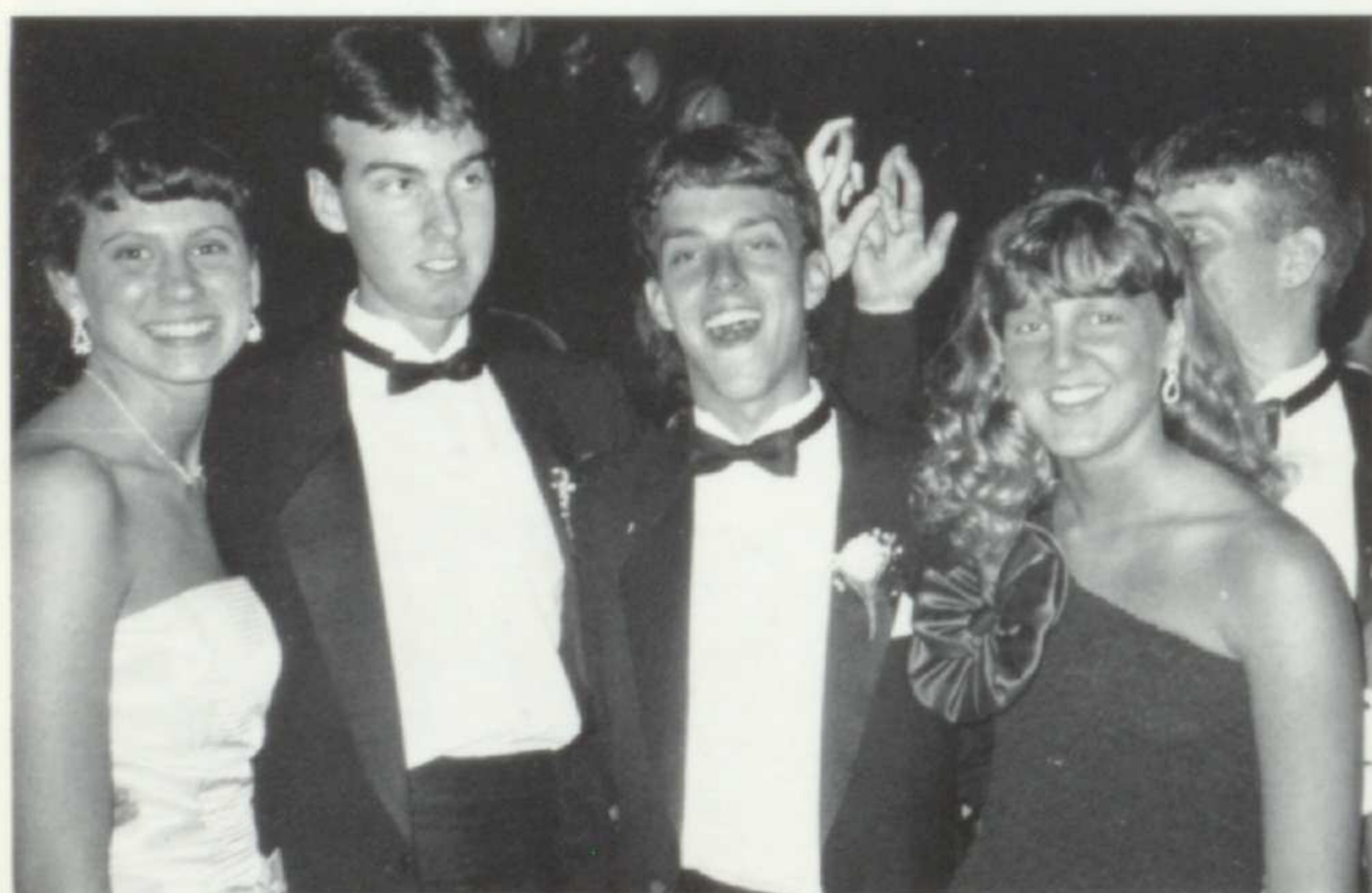

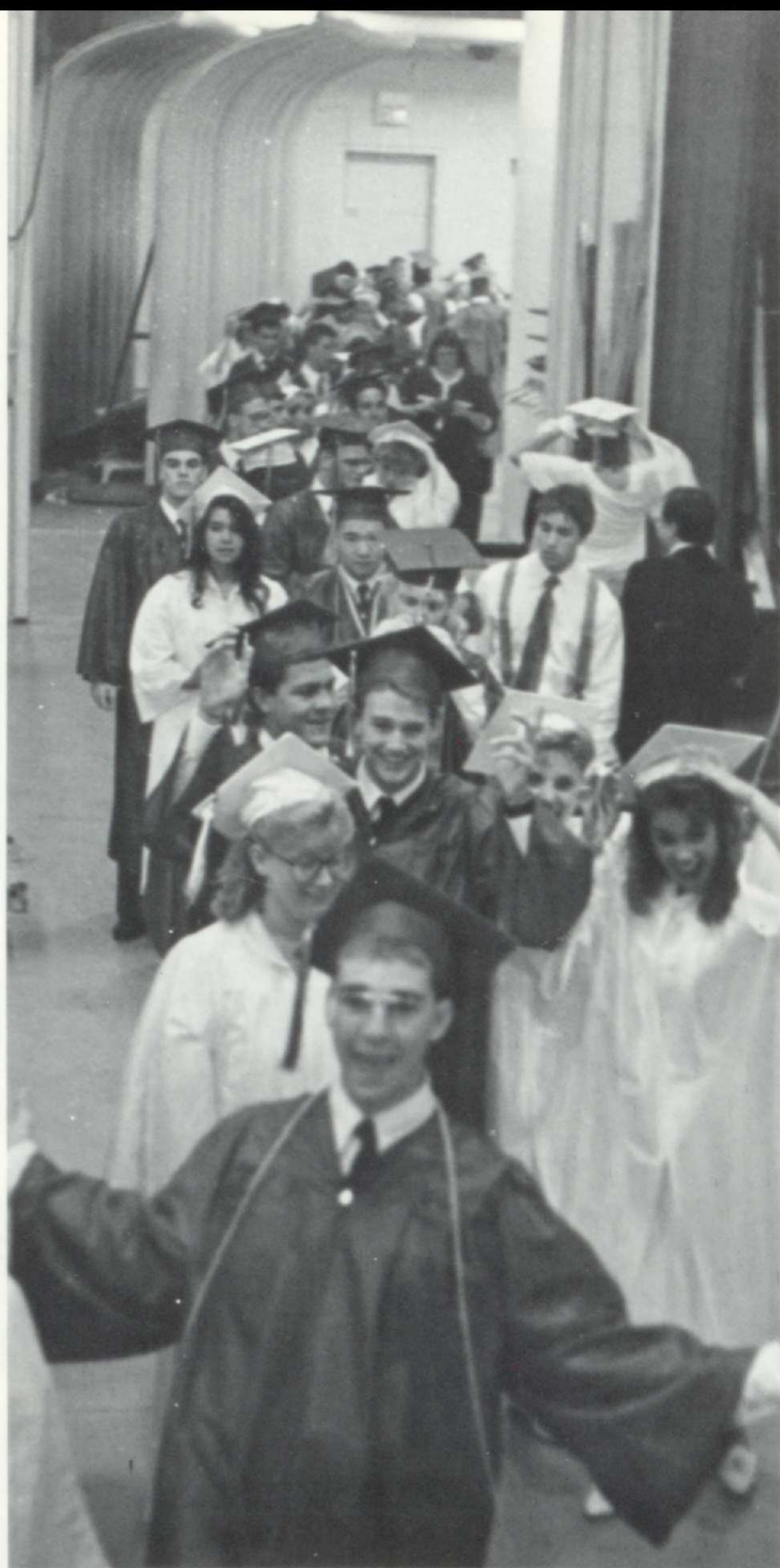

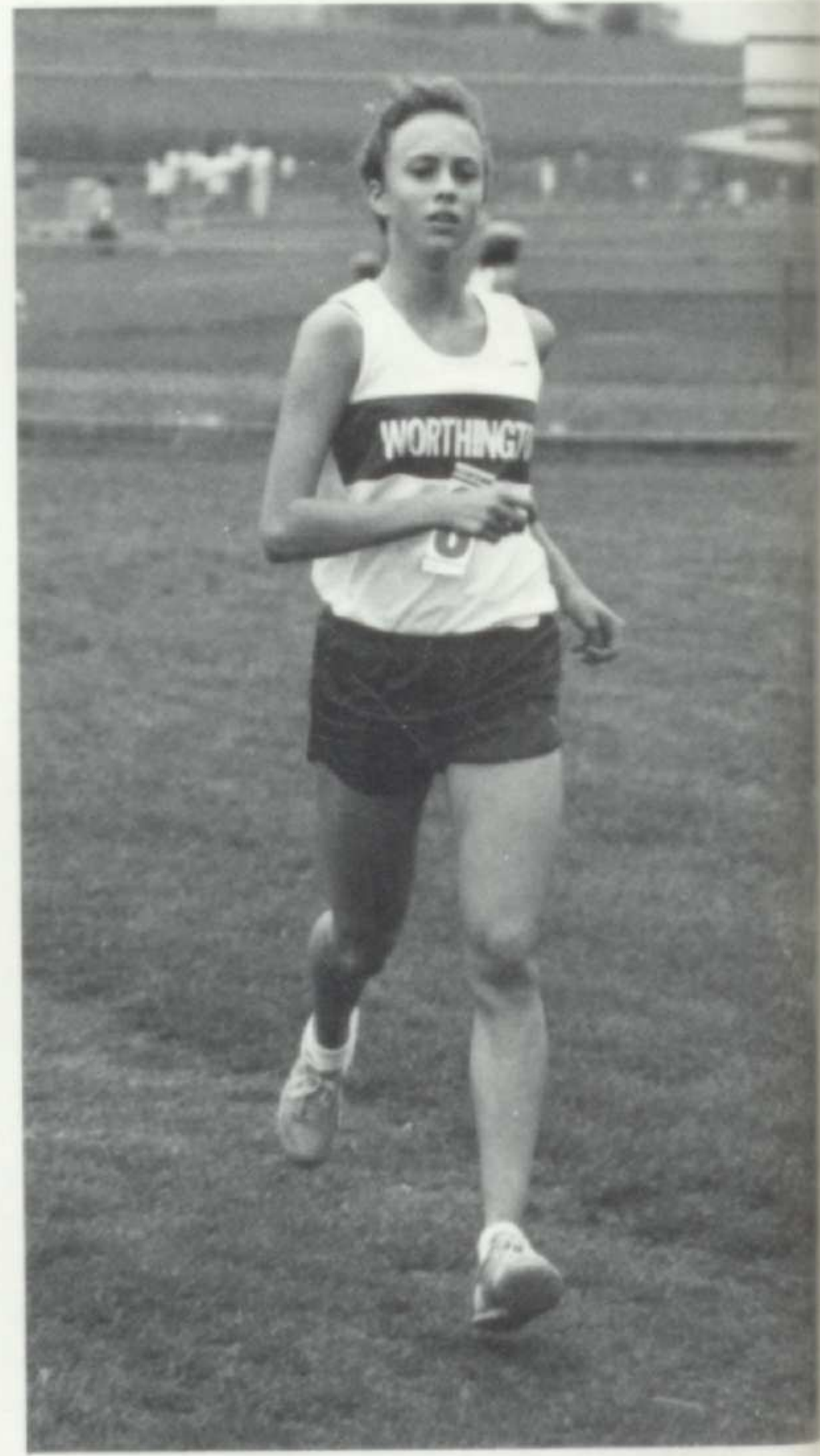

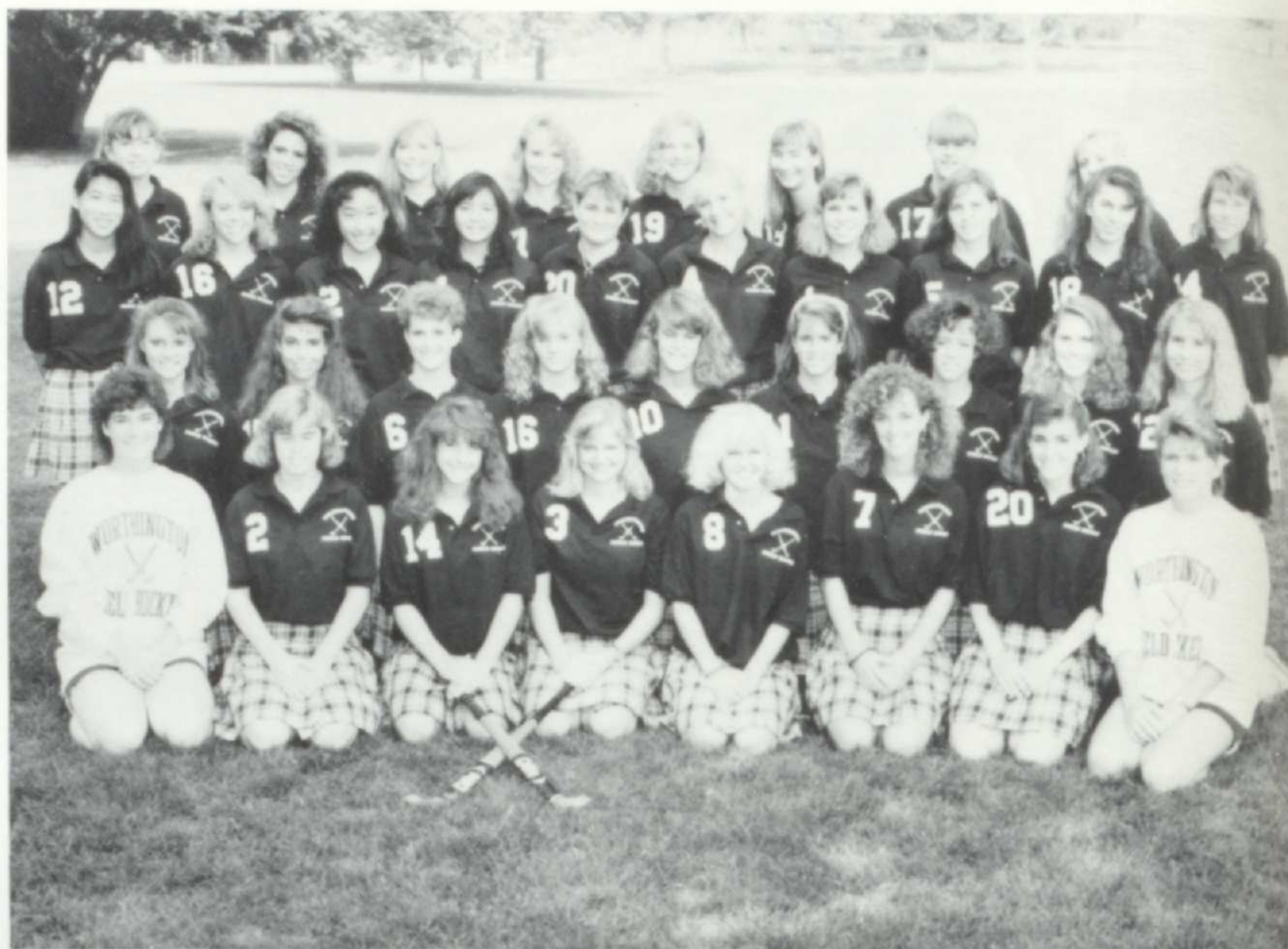

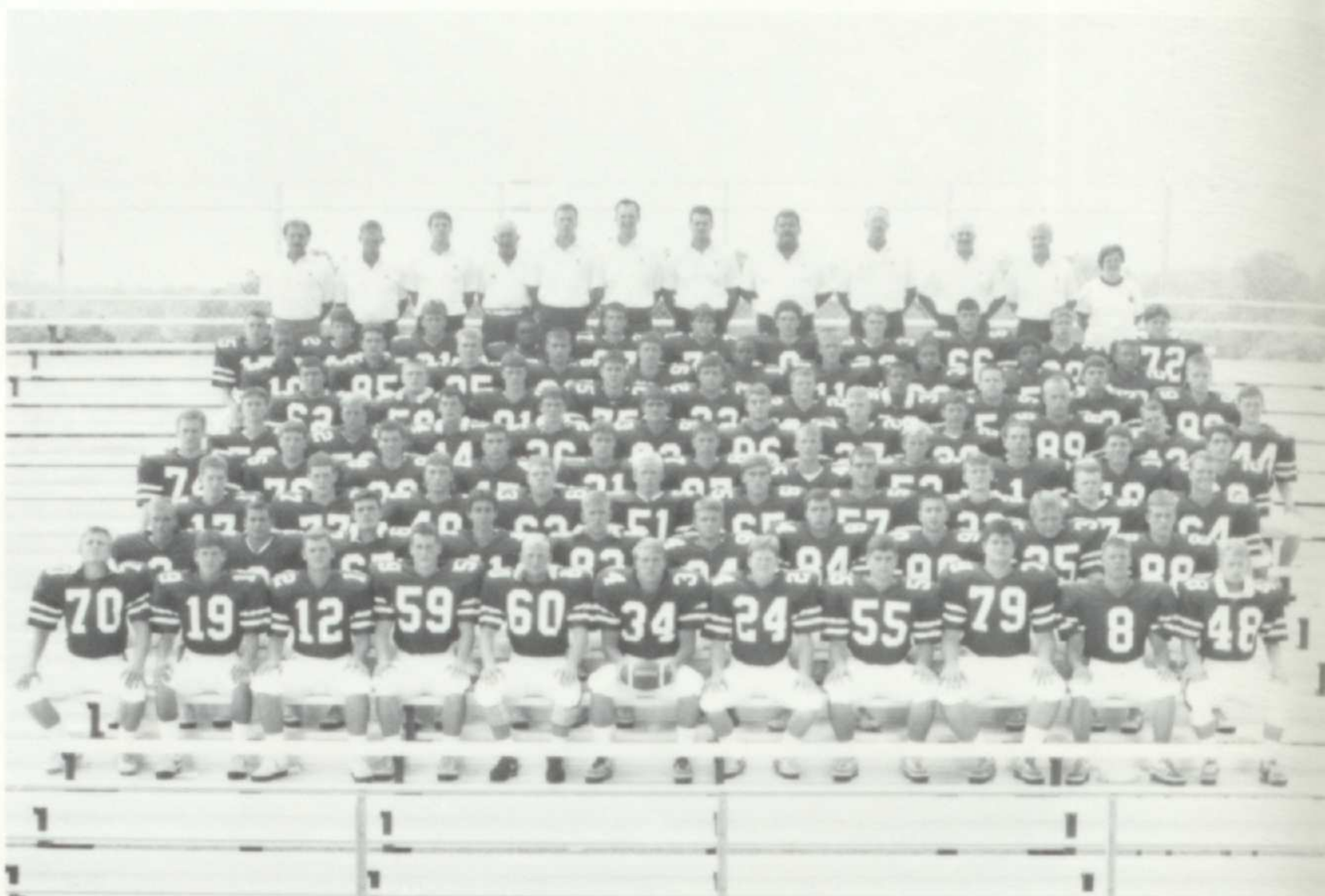

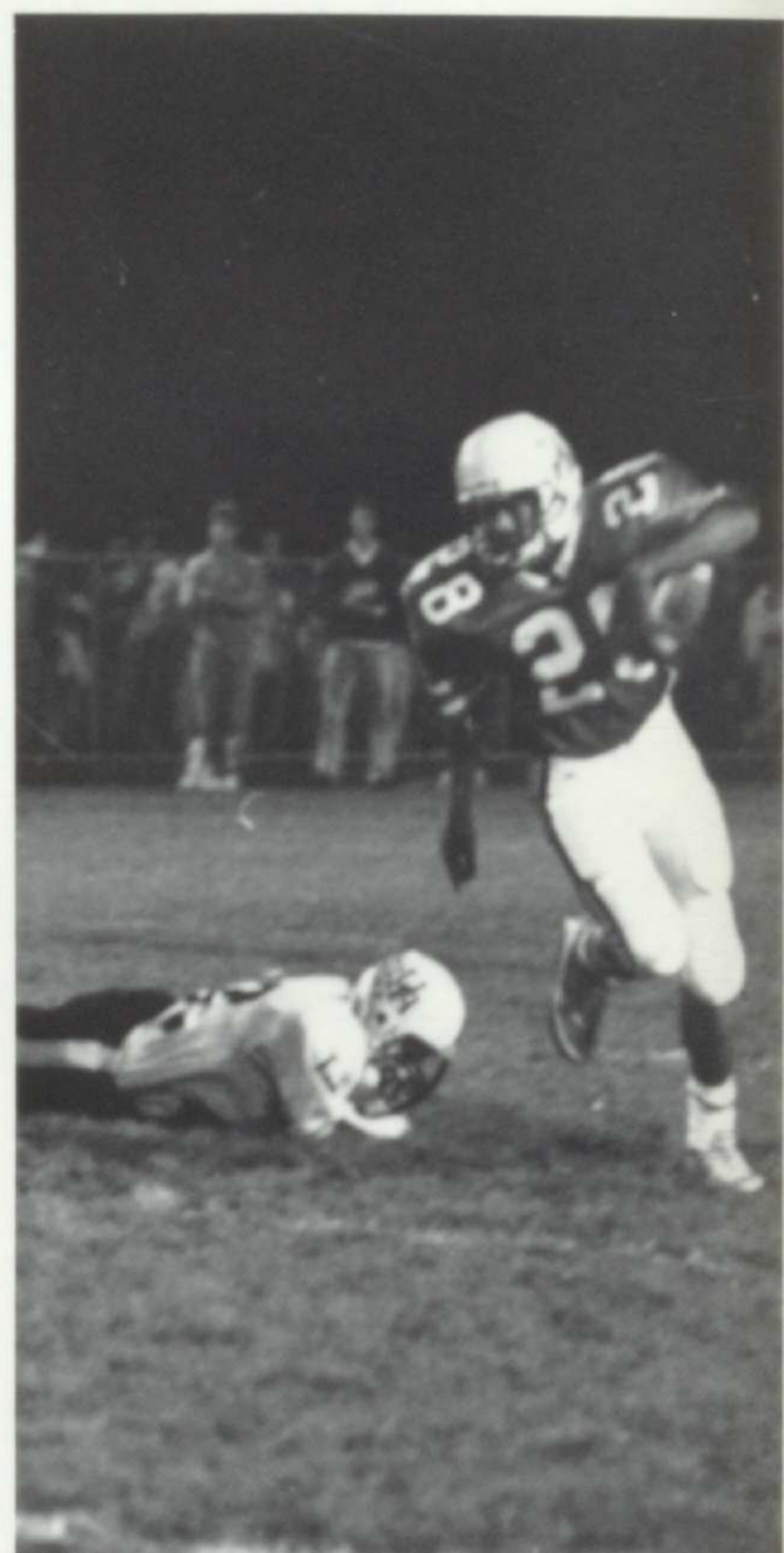

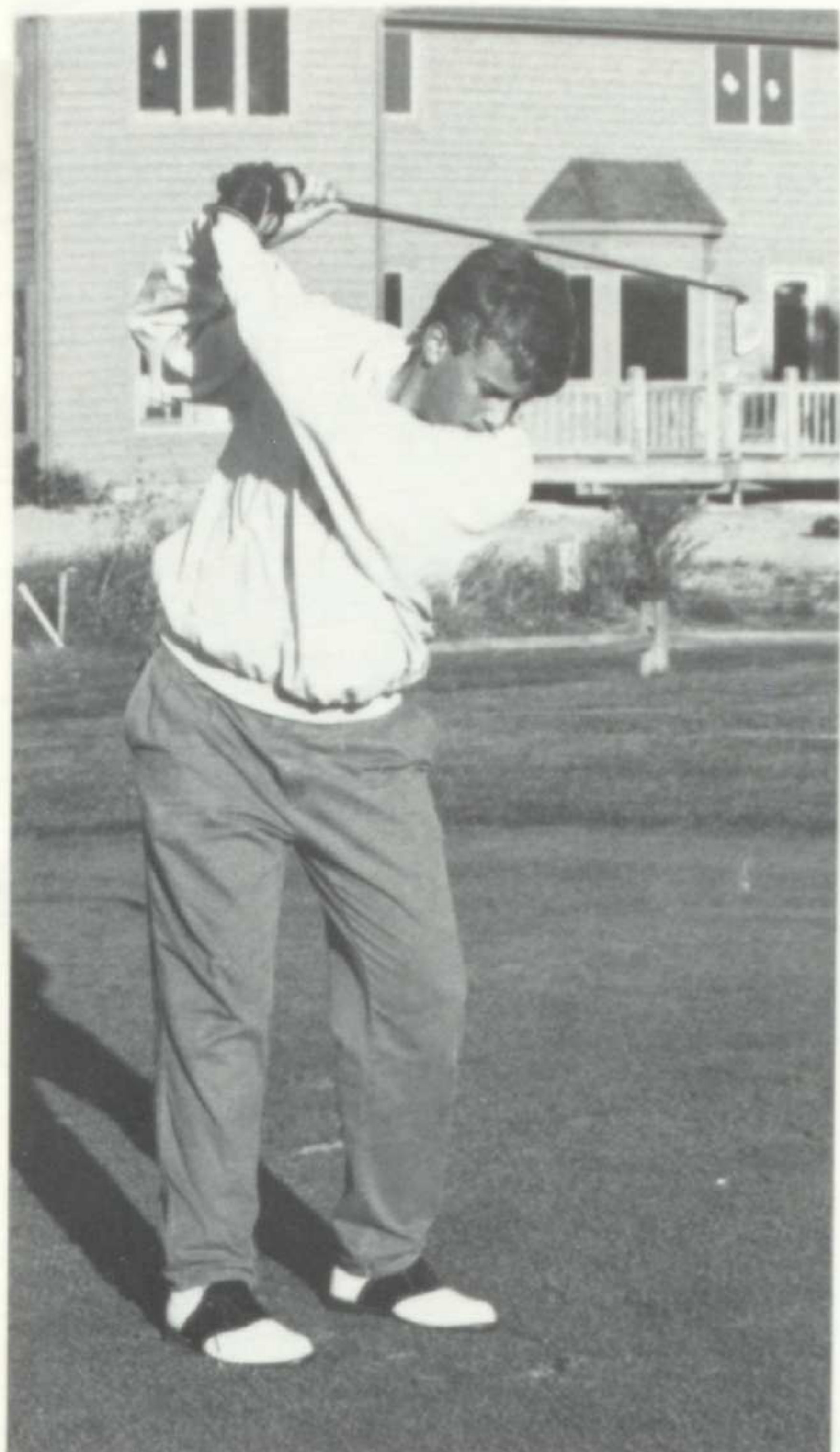

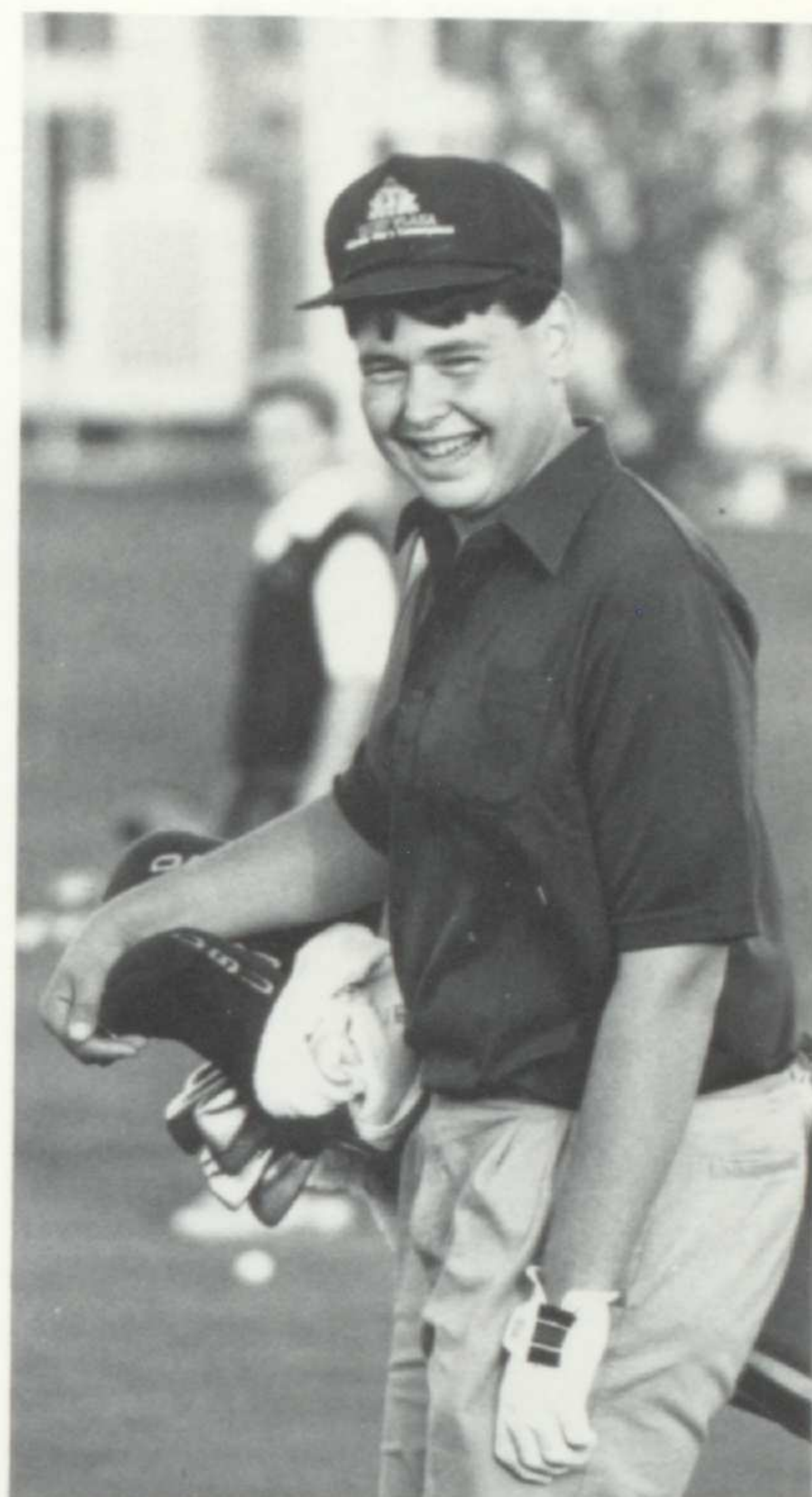

This season was the last for 3 seniors: Kristen Osmond, Shannon Dean, and Doris Garraway.

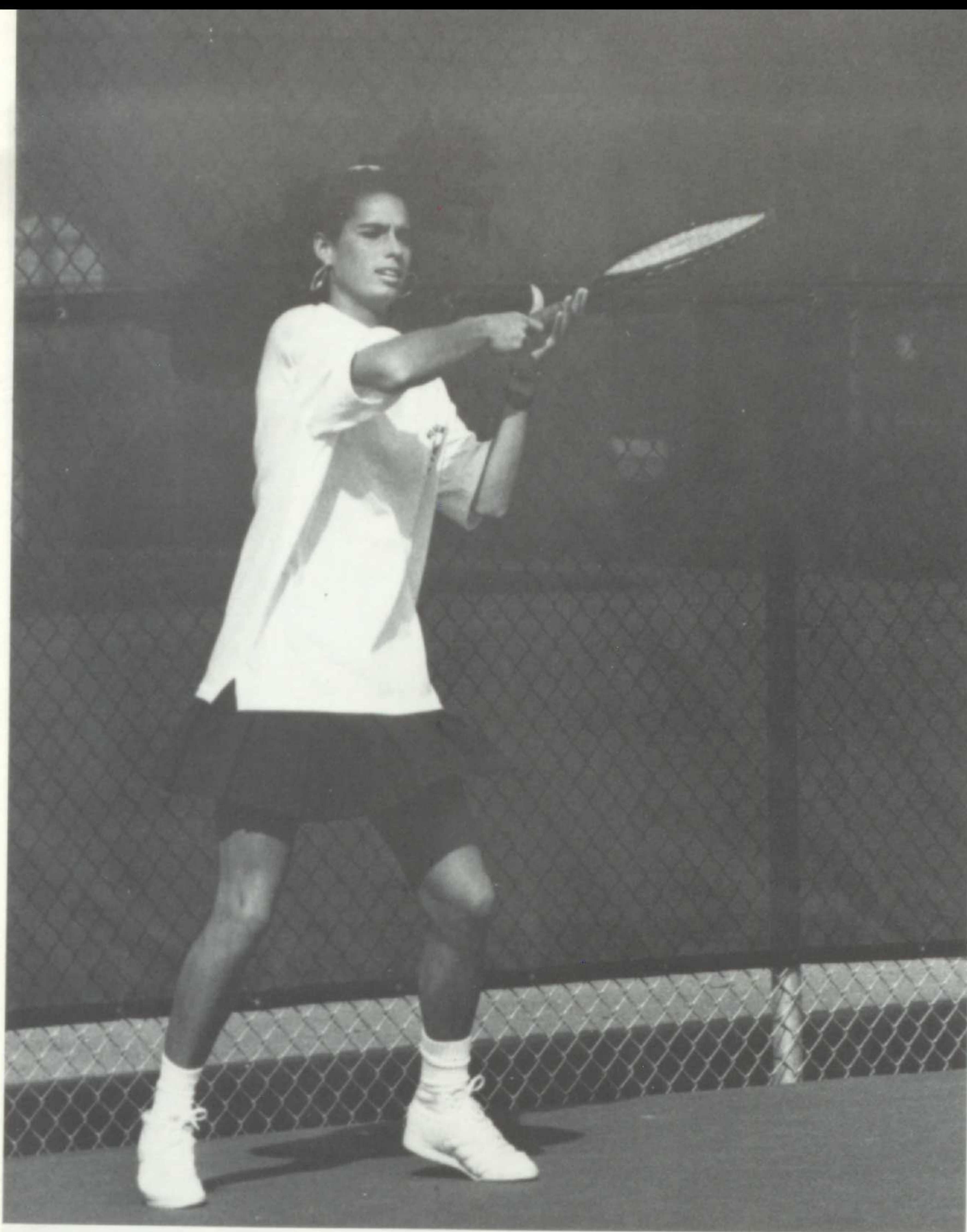

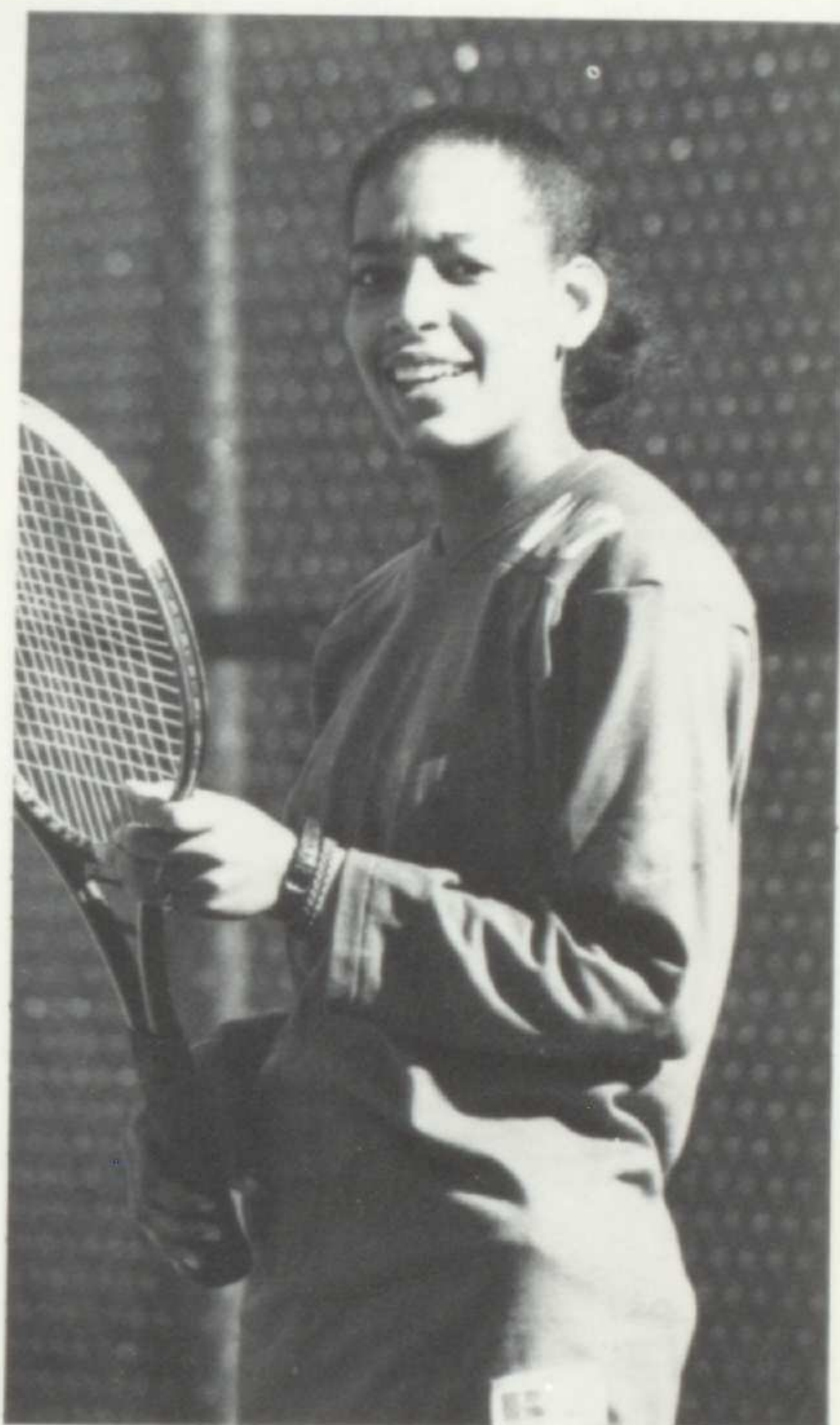

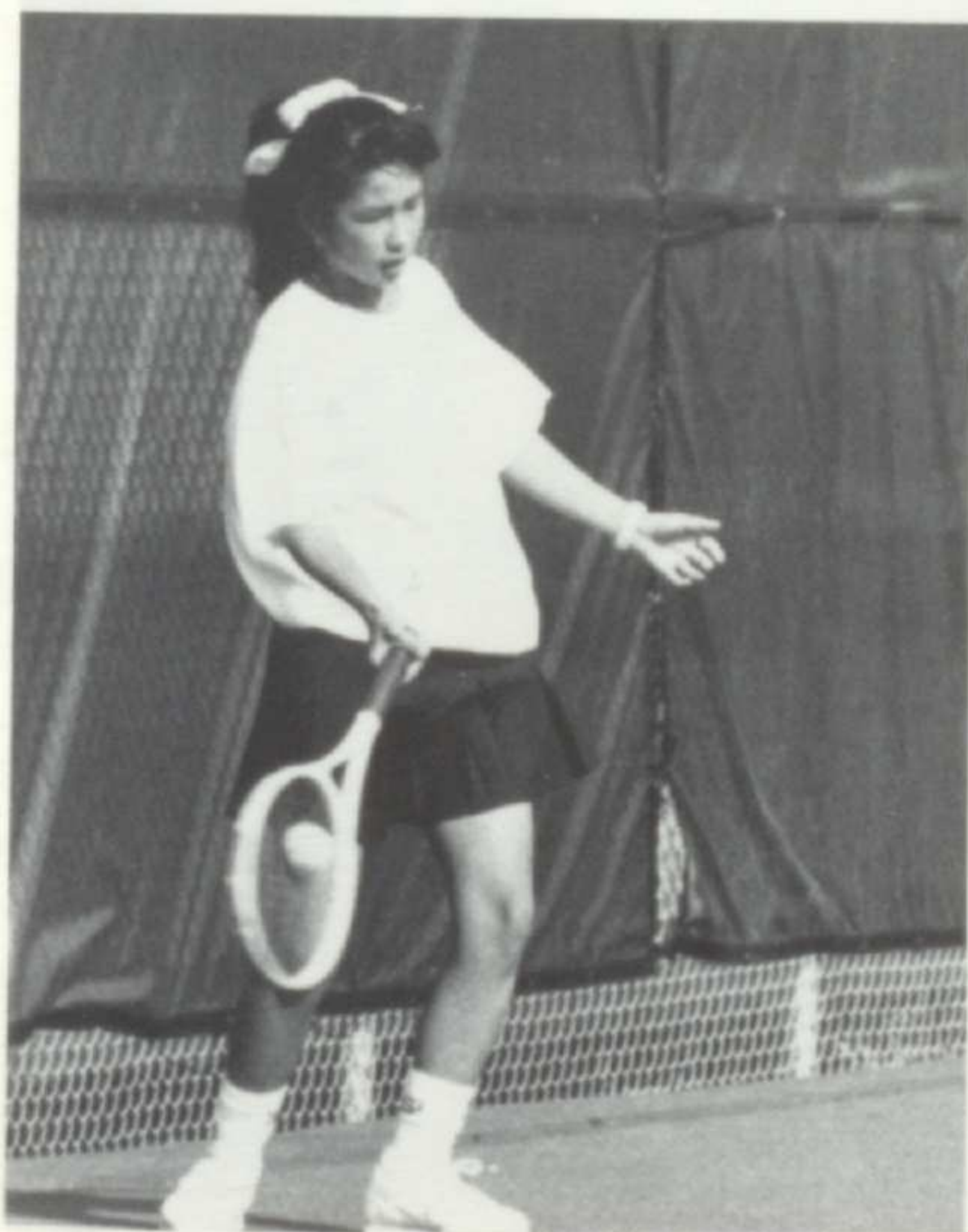

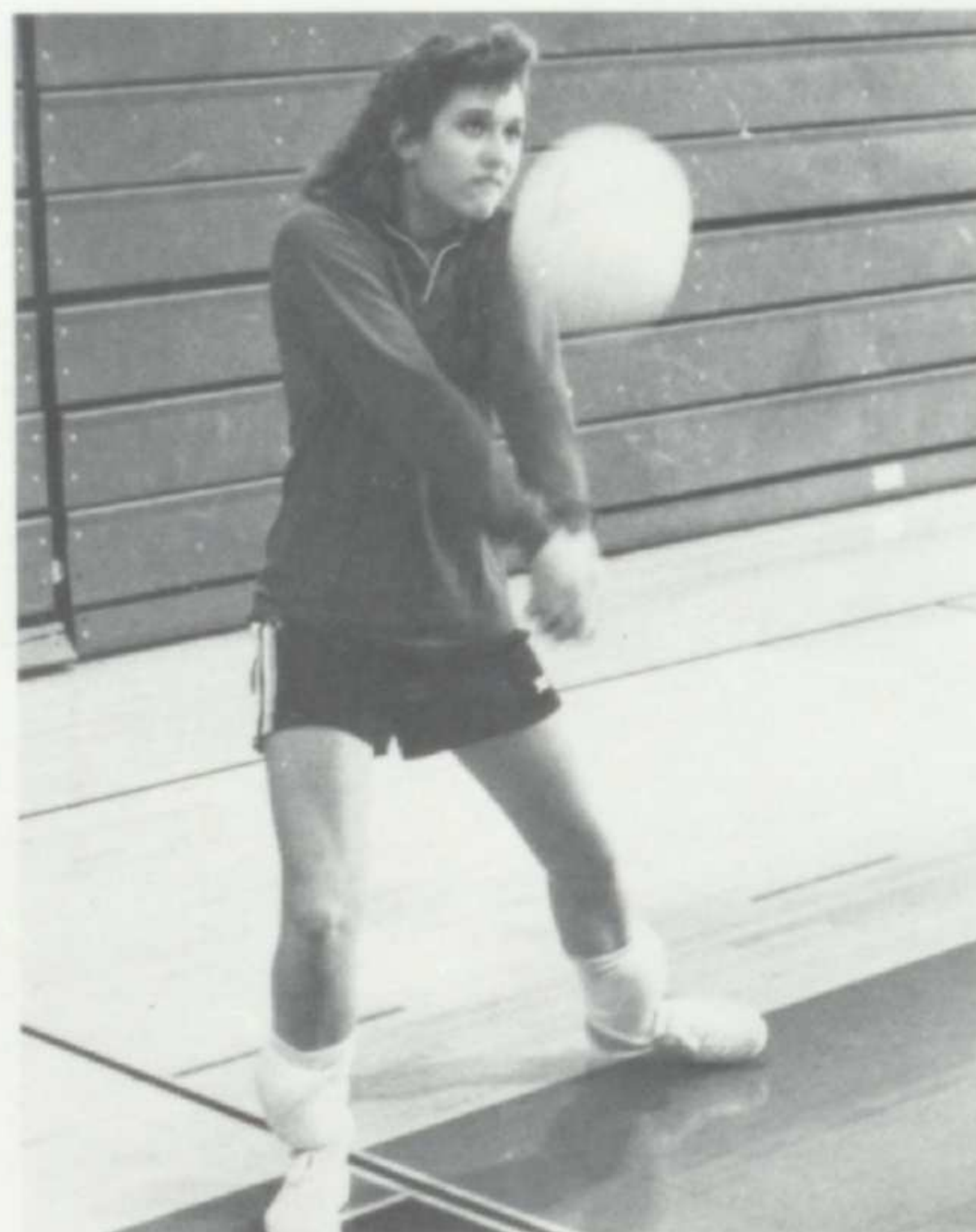

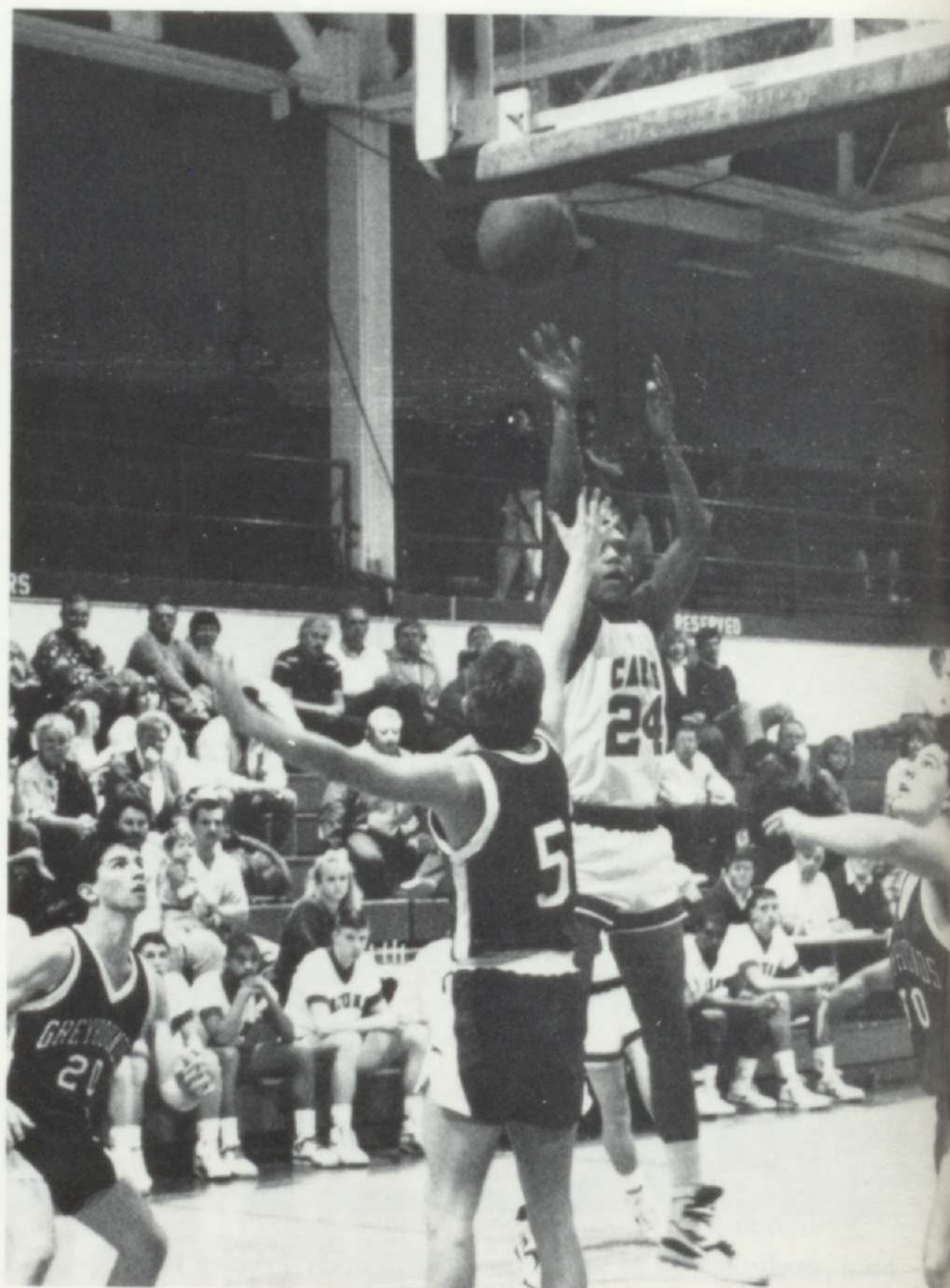

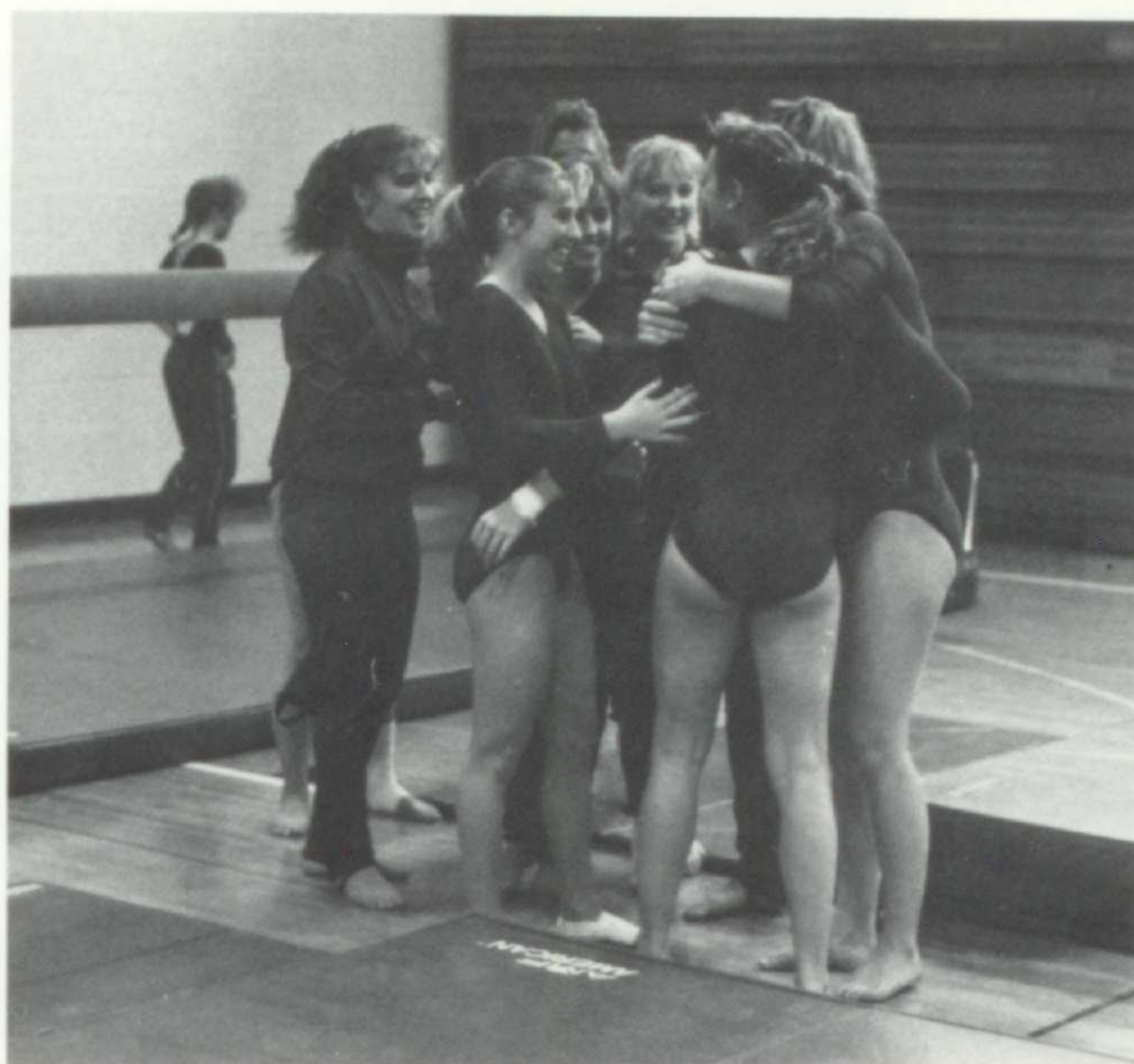
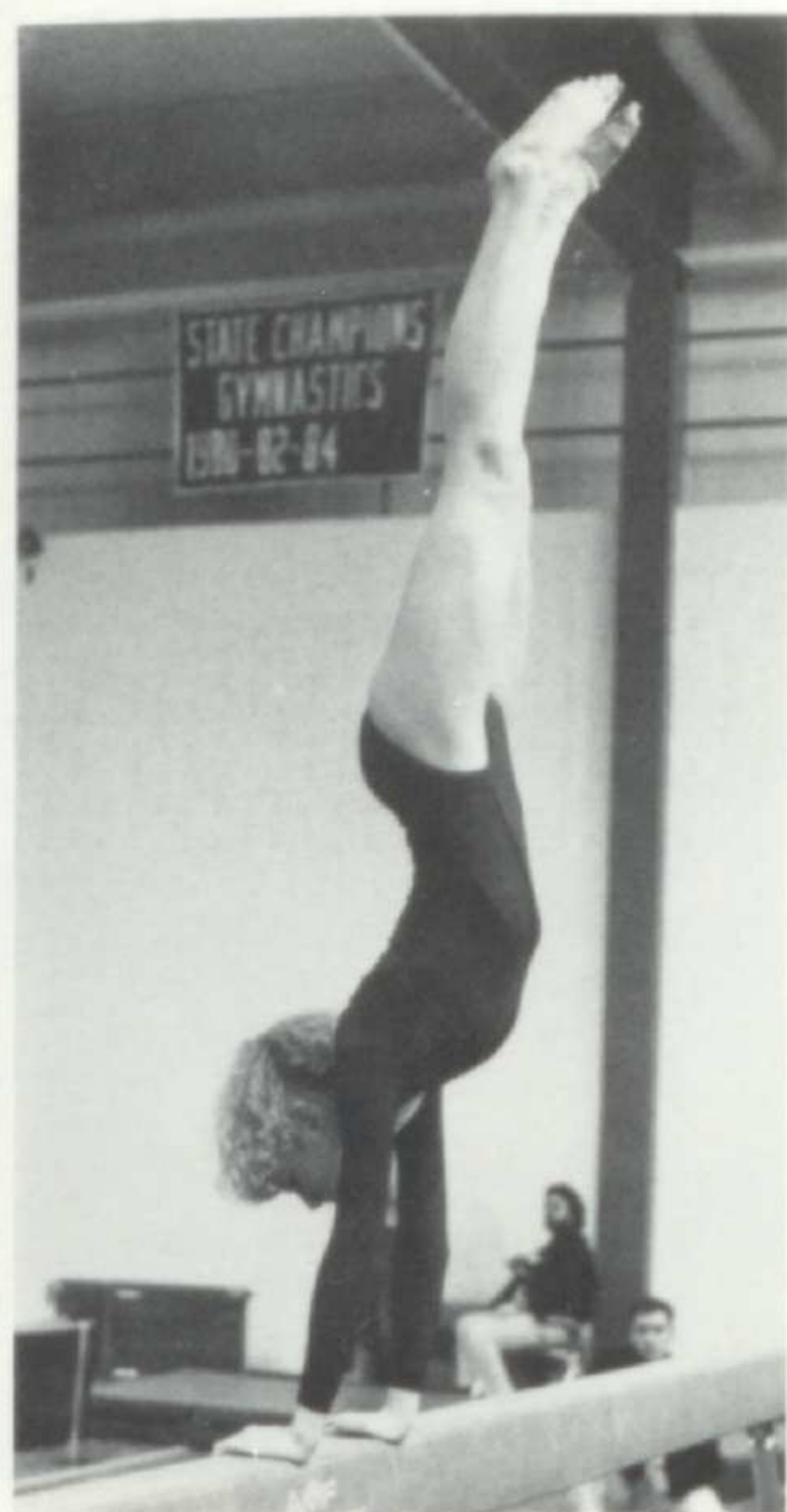

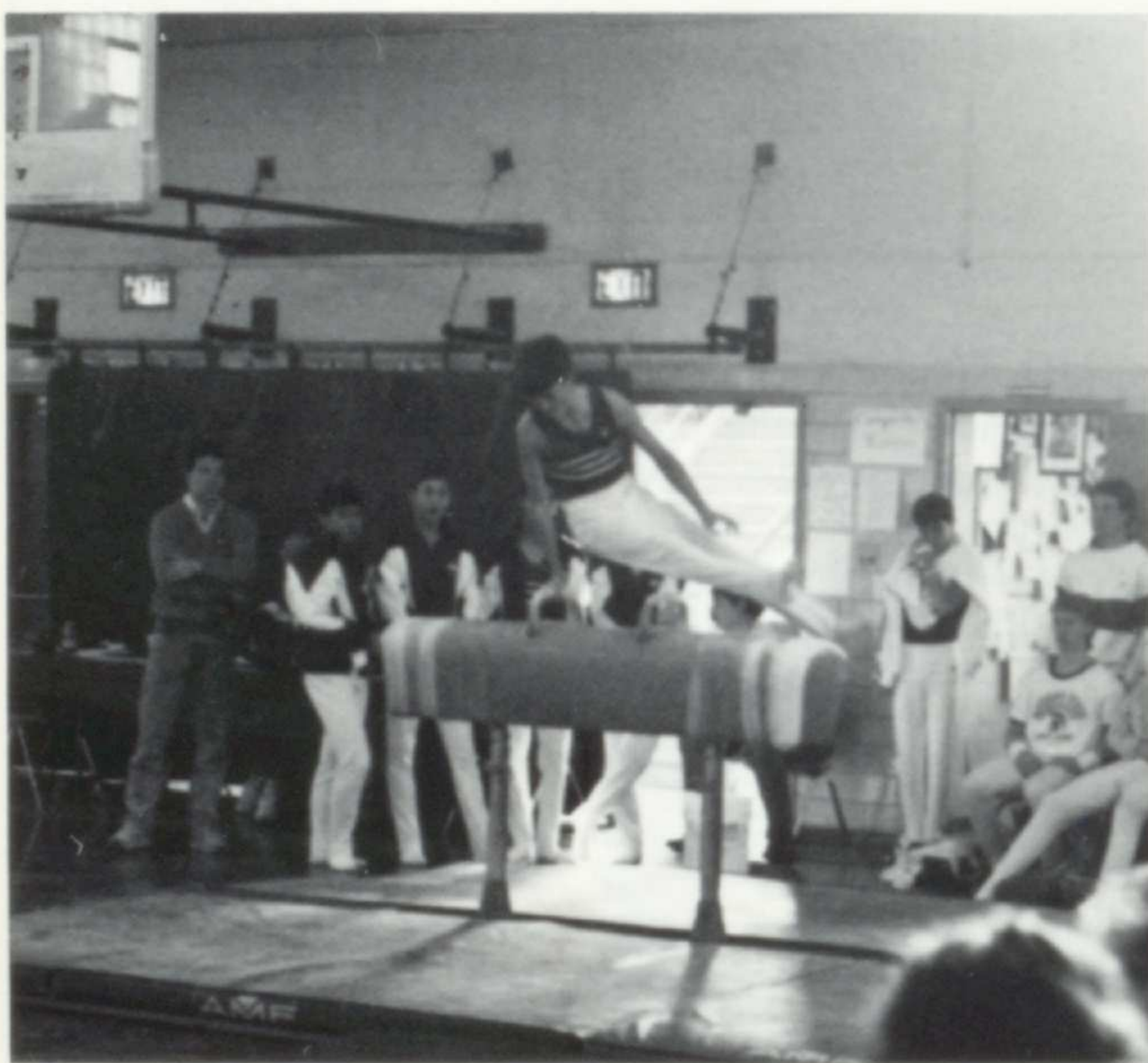

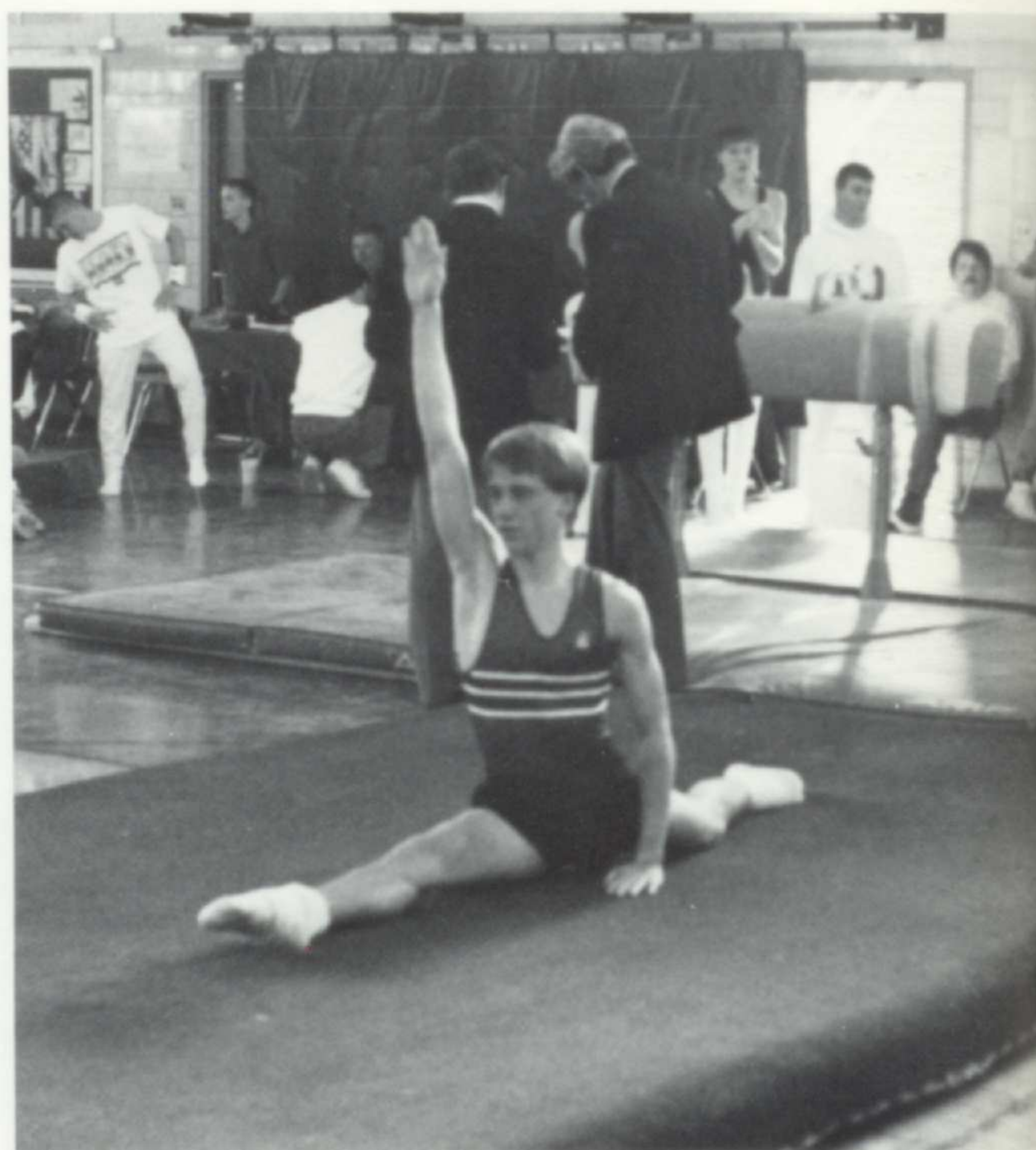

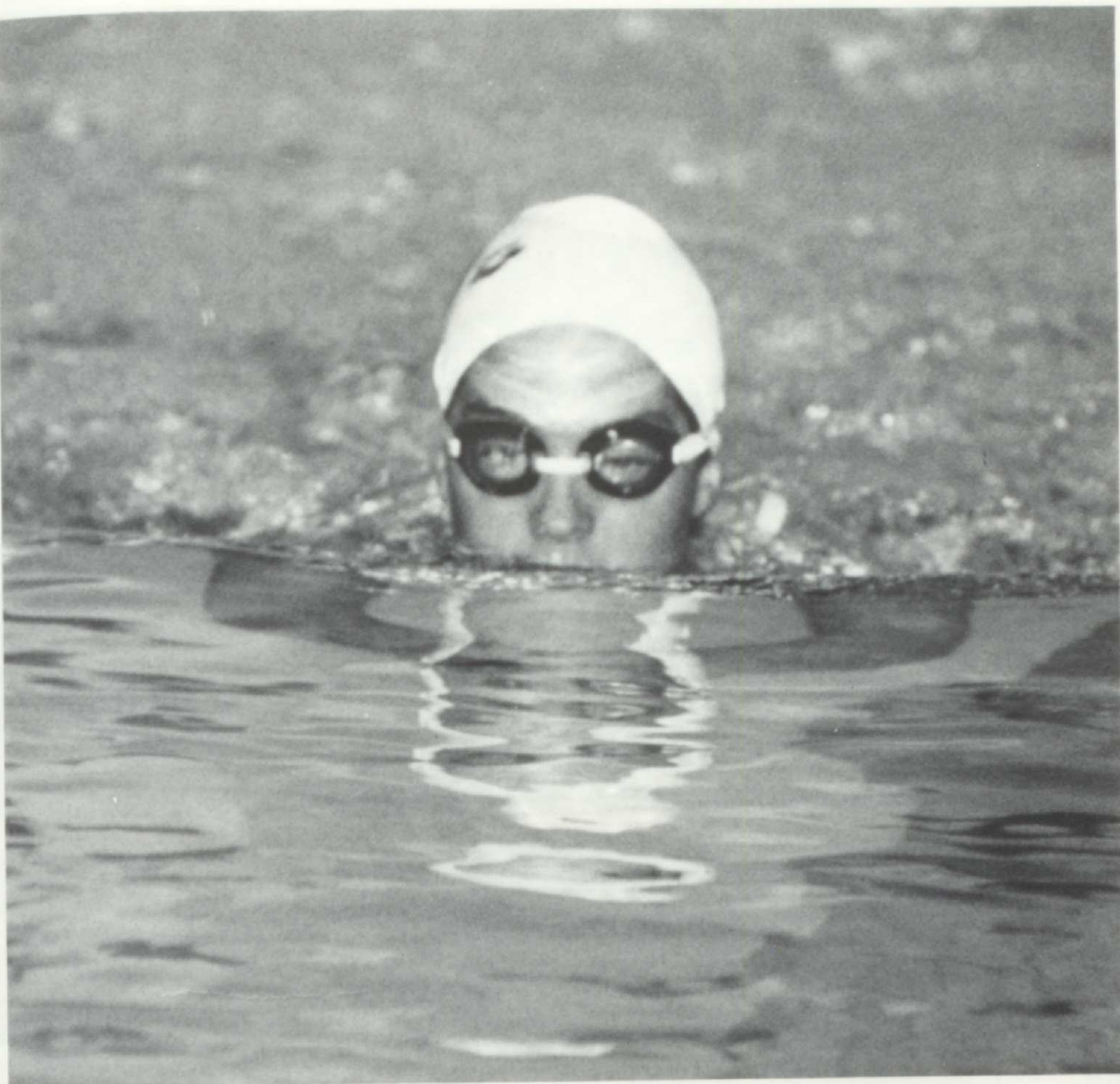

ed Coach Jim Callahan.

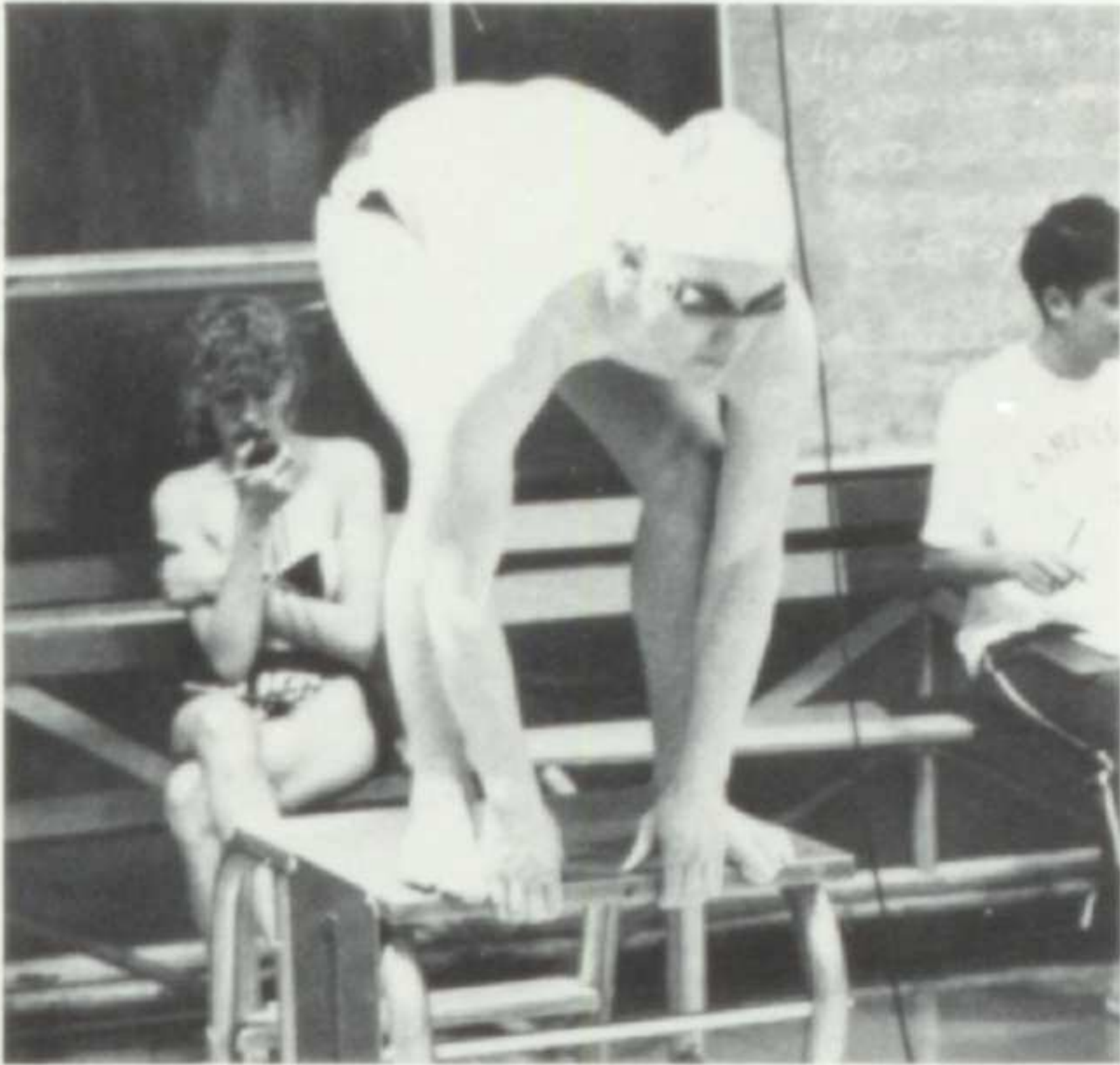

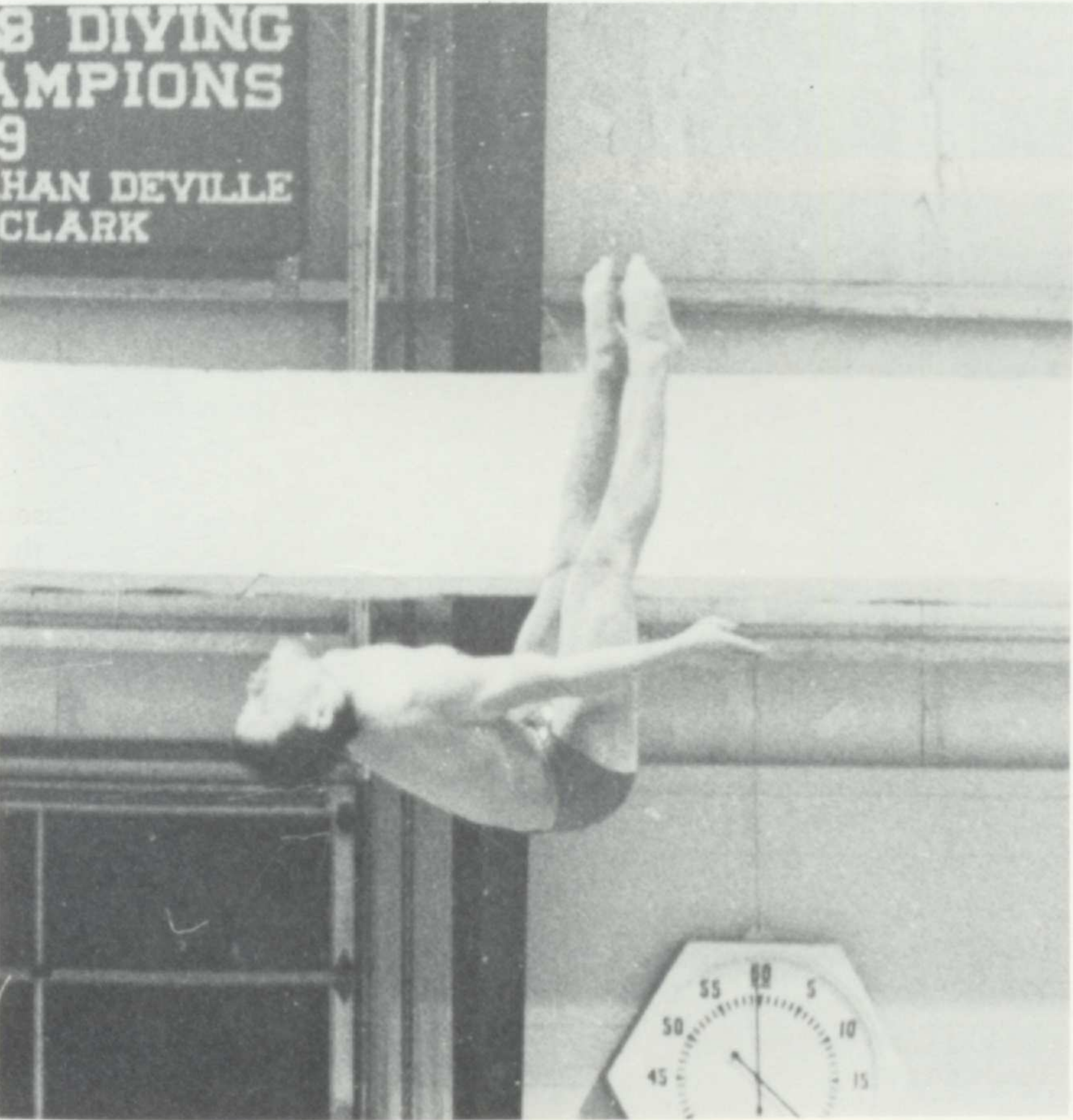

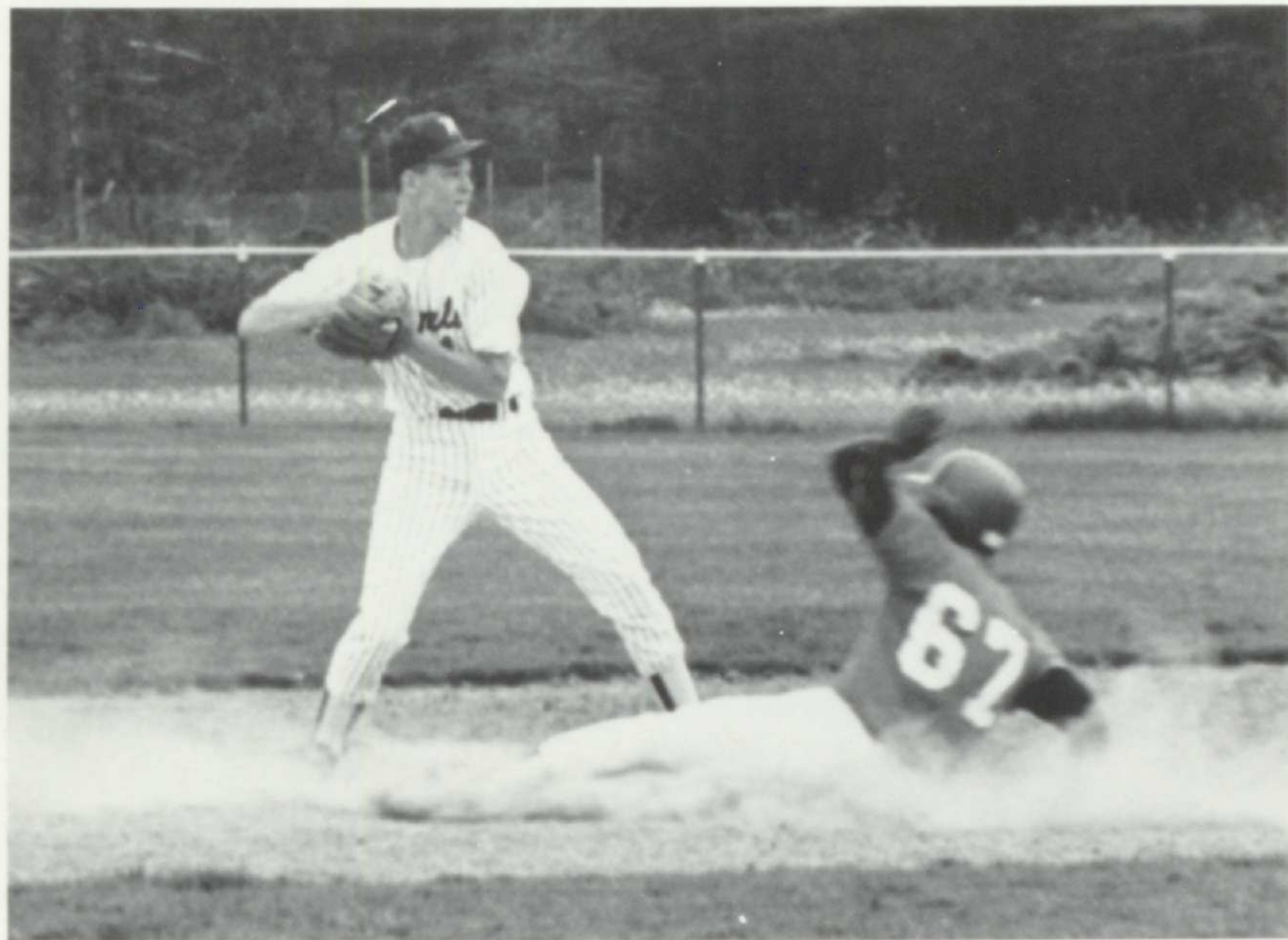

Laxmen Win State Championship

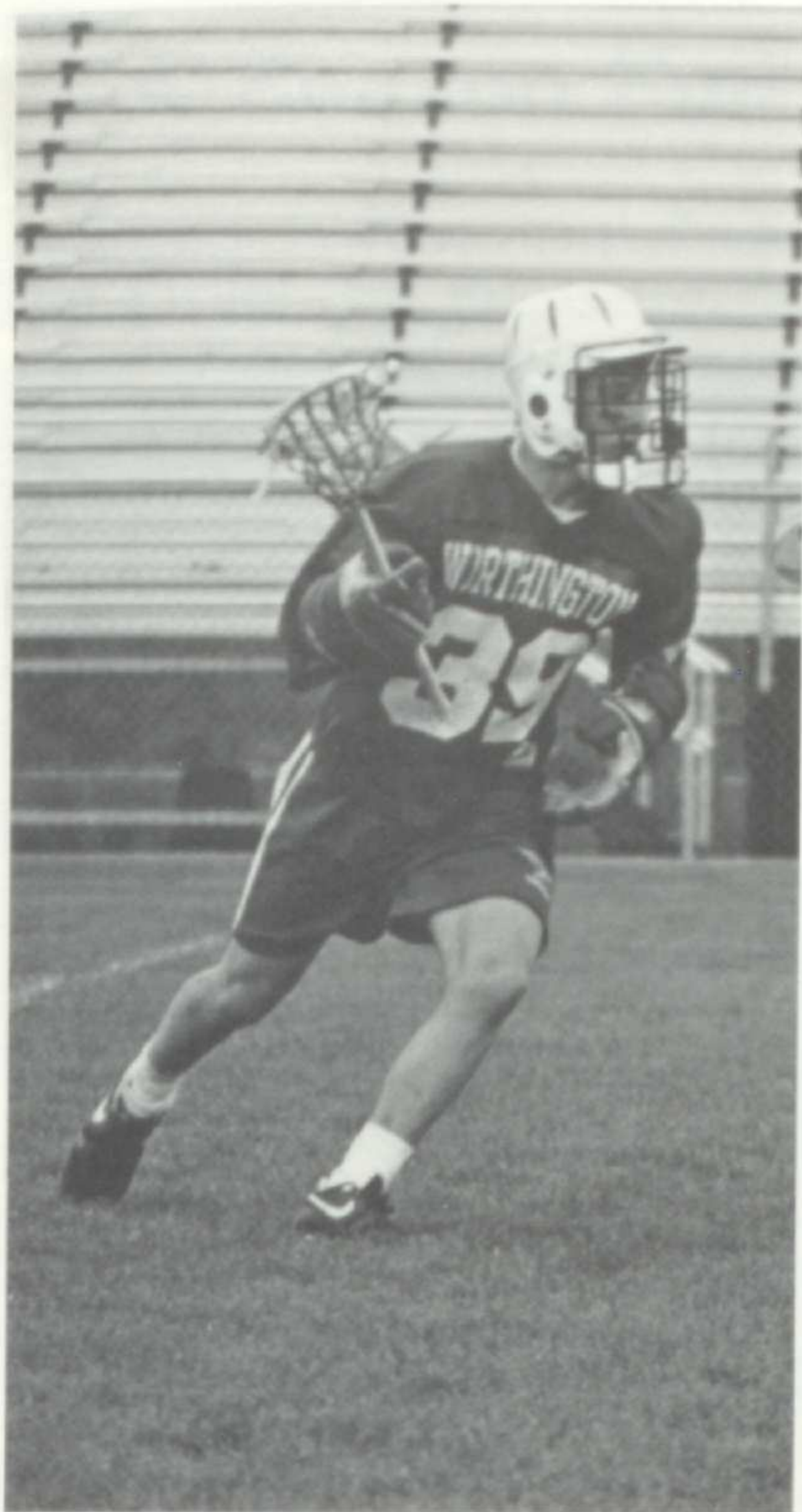

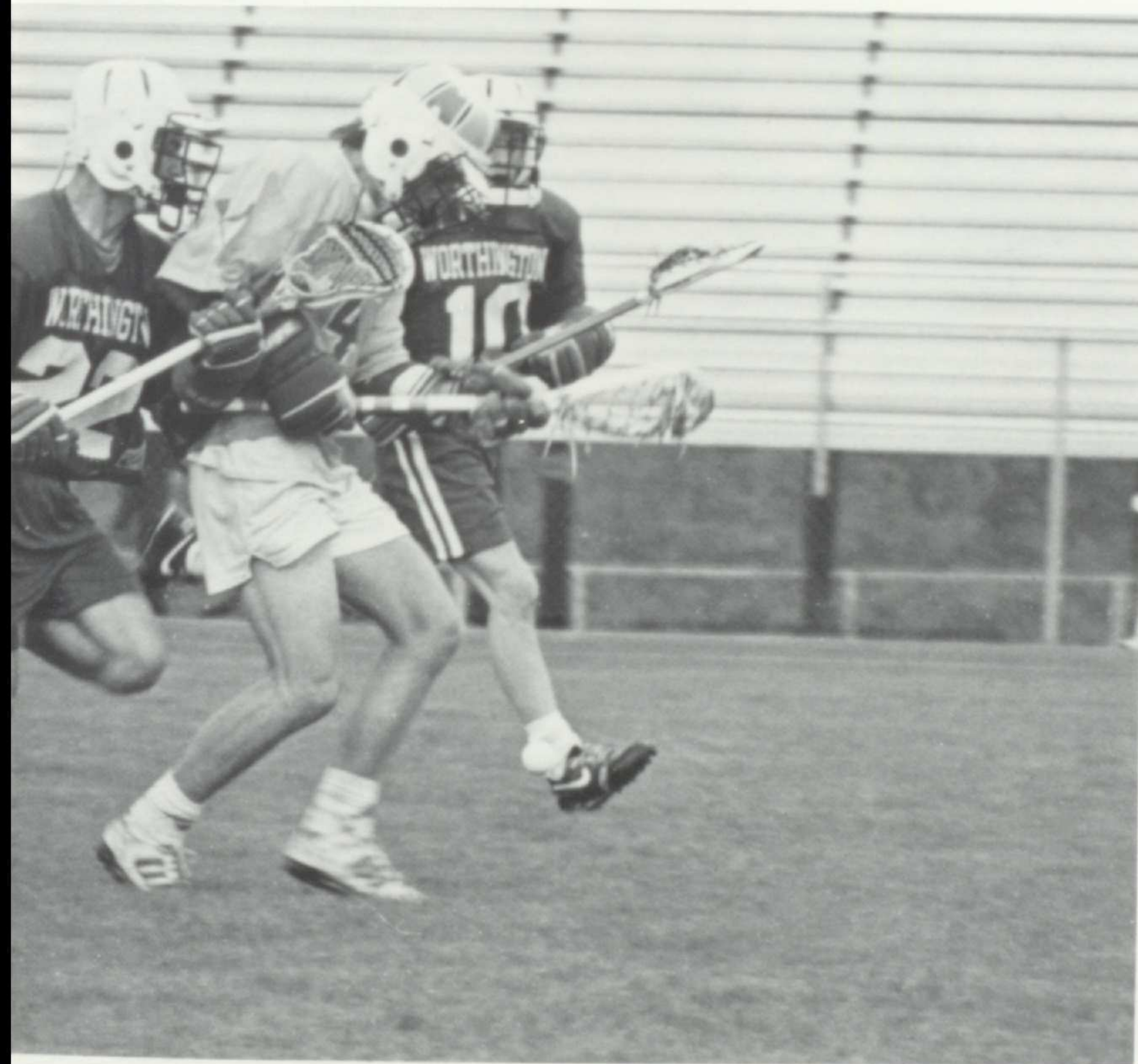

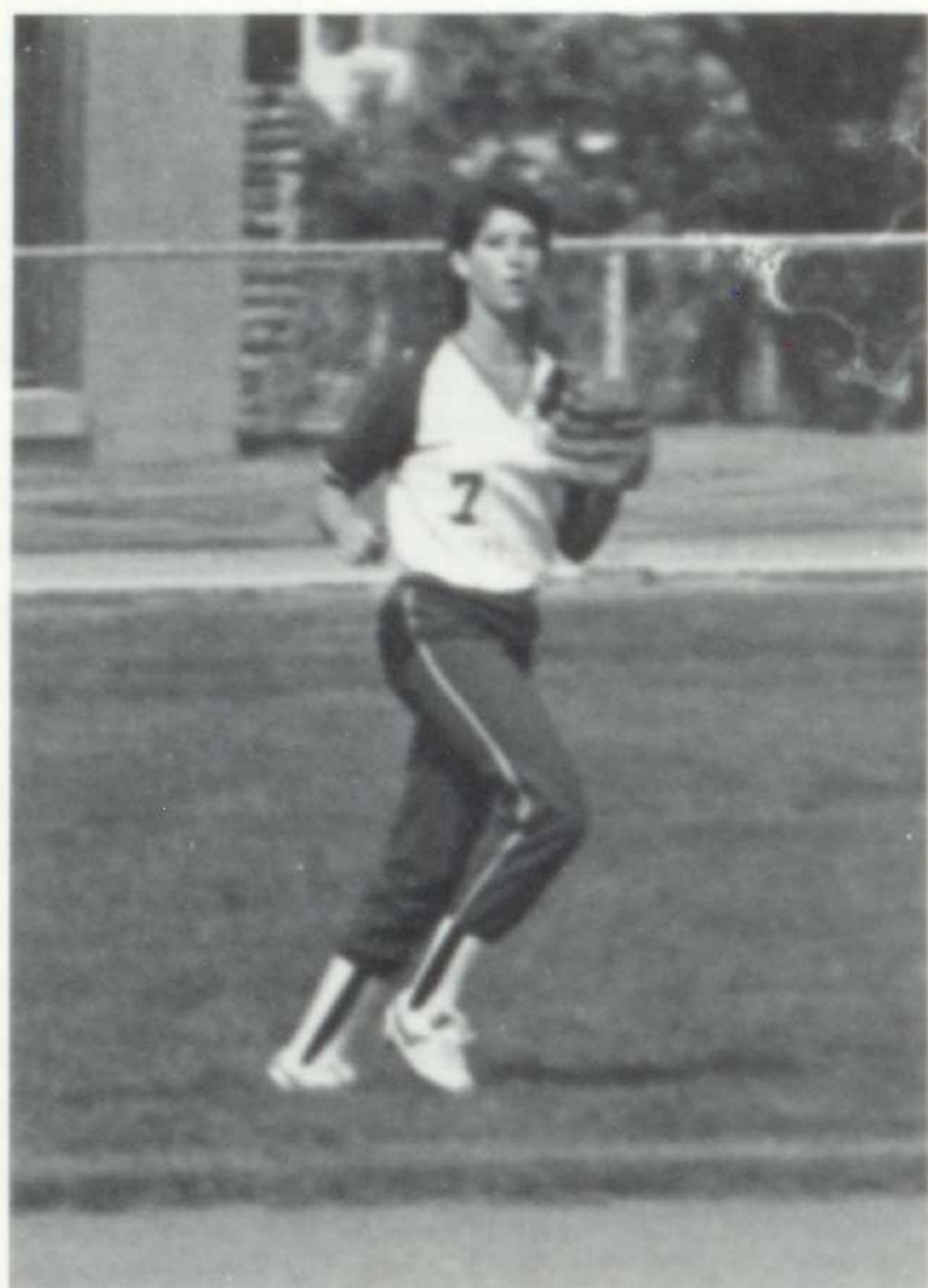

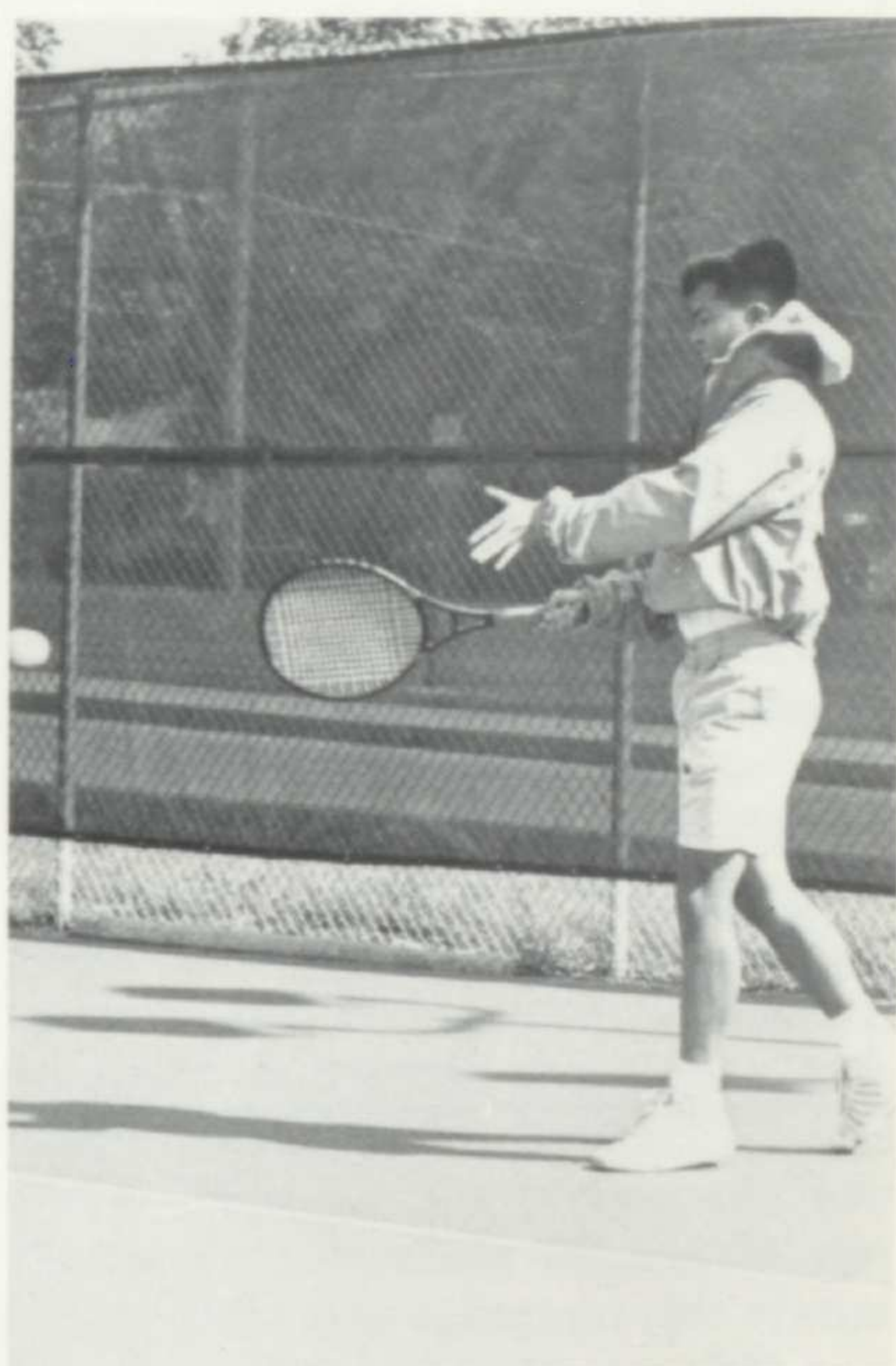

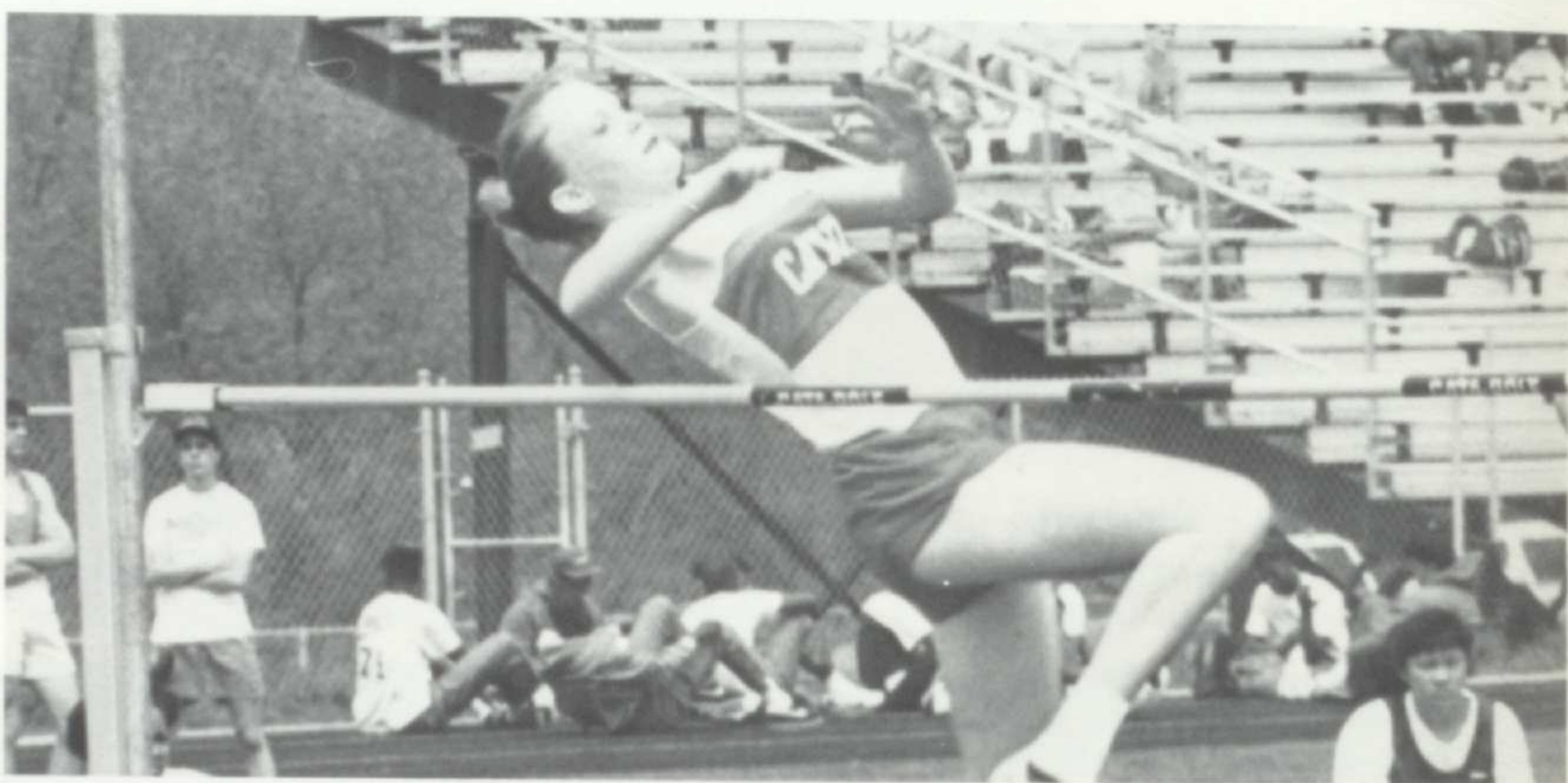

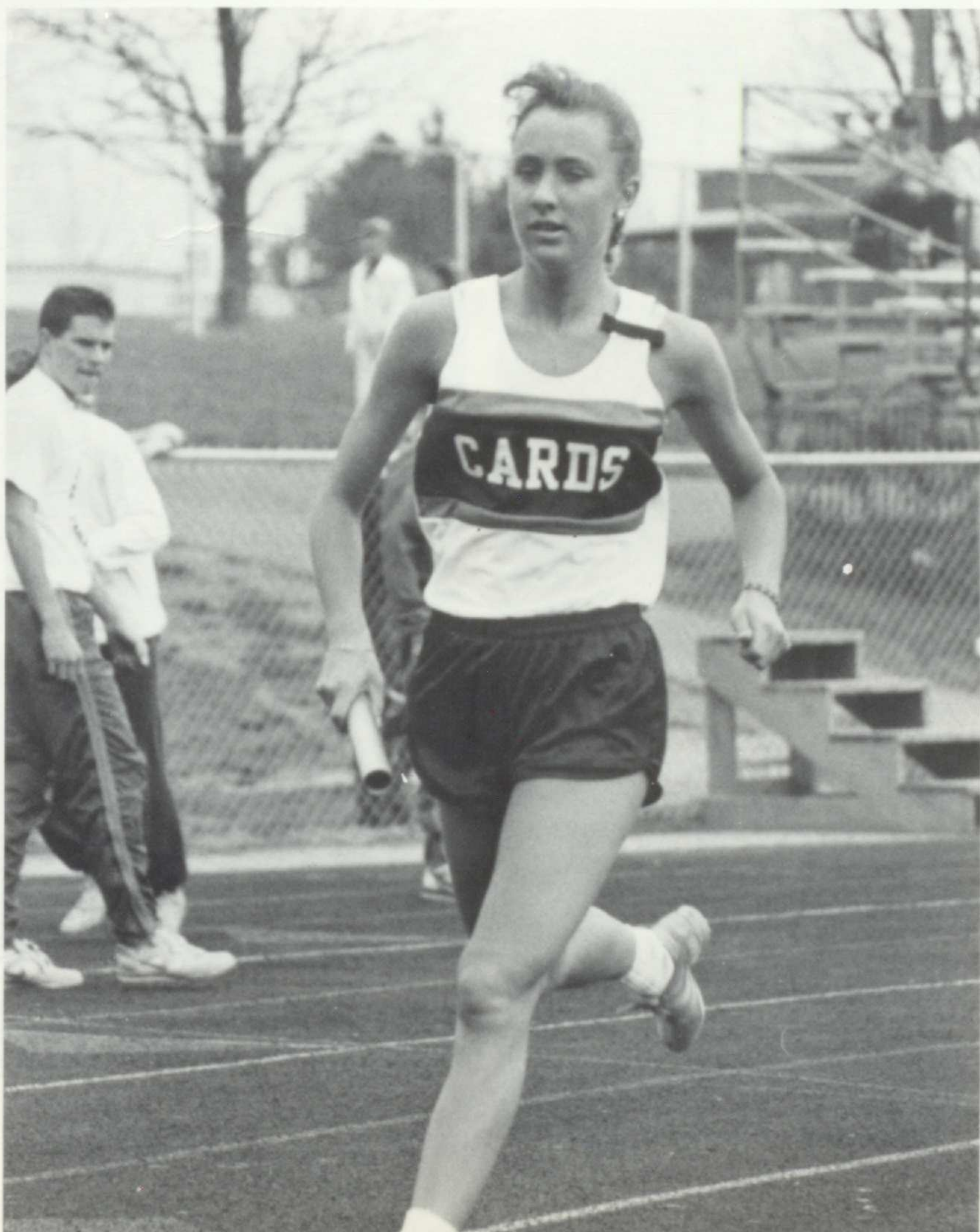

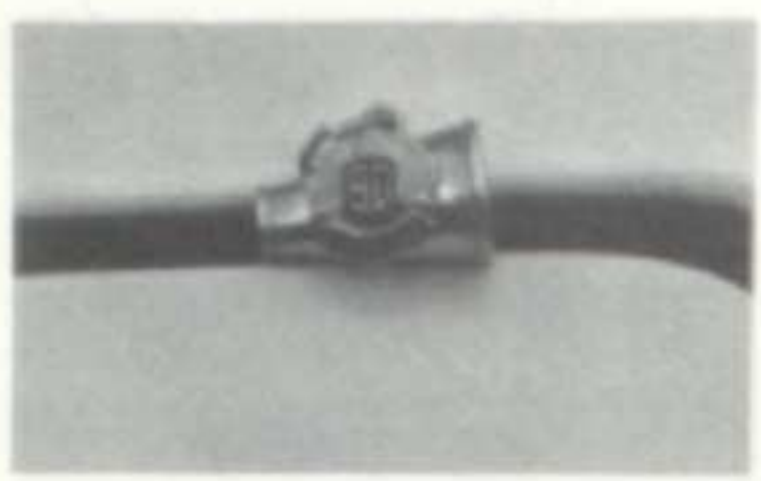
placed third in the State. Mike Beckwith joined the team for the Regional and State competition replacing Kirby. Harlow also qualified for States in the 800 meter run.

but they really seemed to catch on. It was sheer poetry in motion watching them work . . . they even taught me a thing or two."

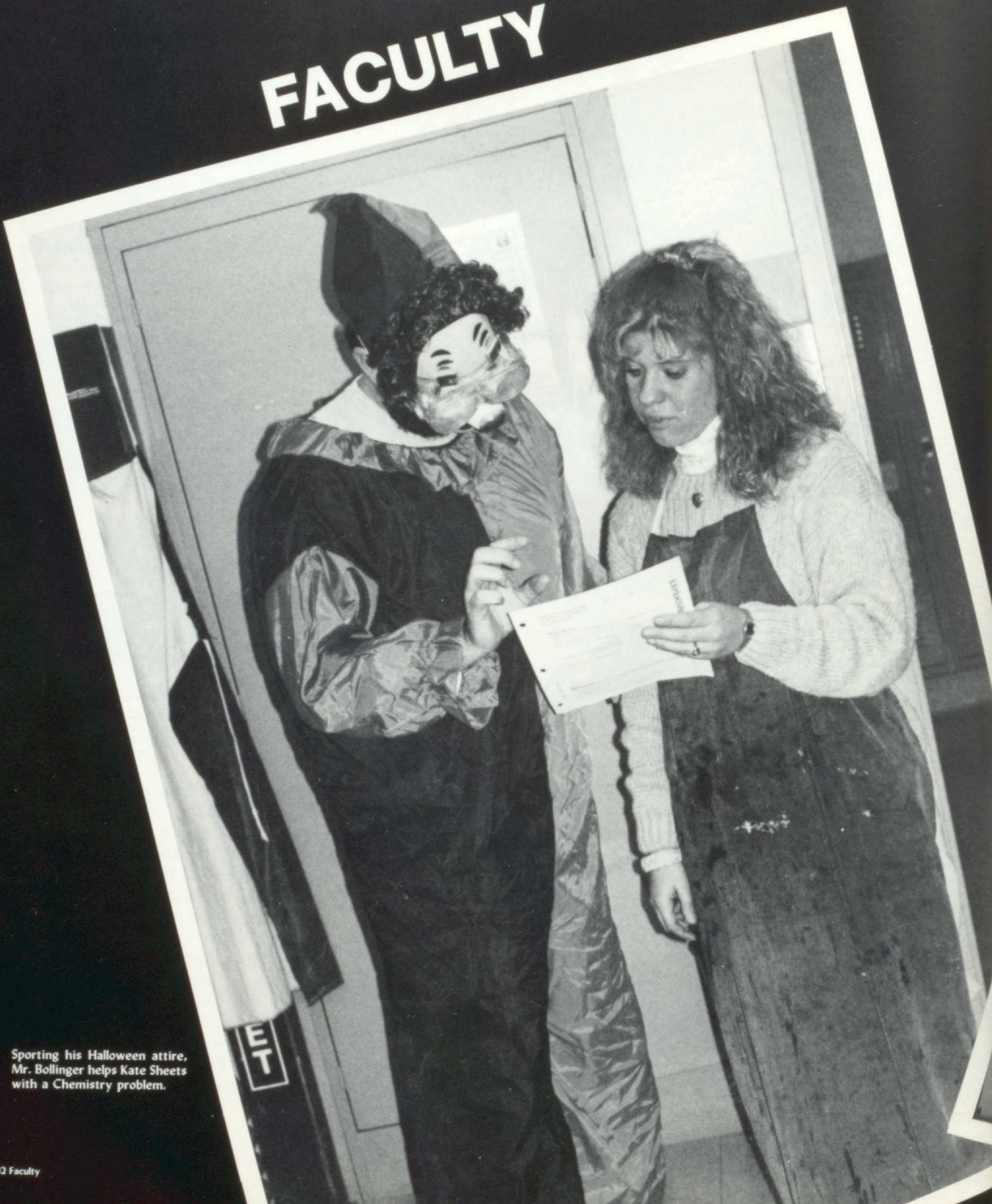

Though they slaved daily, not a complaint was heard except maybe

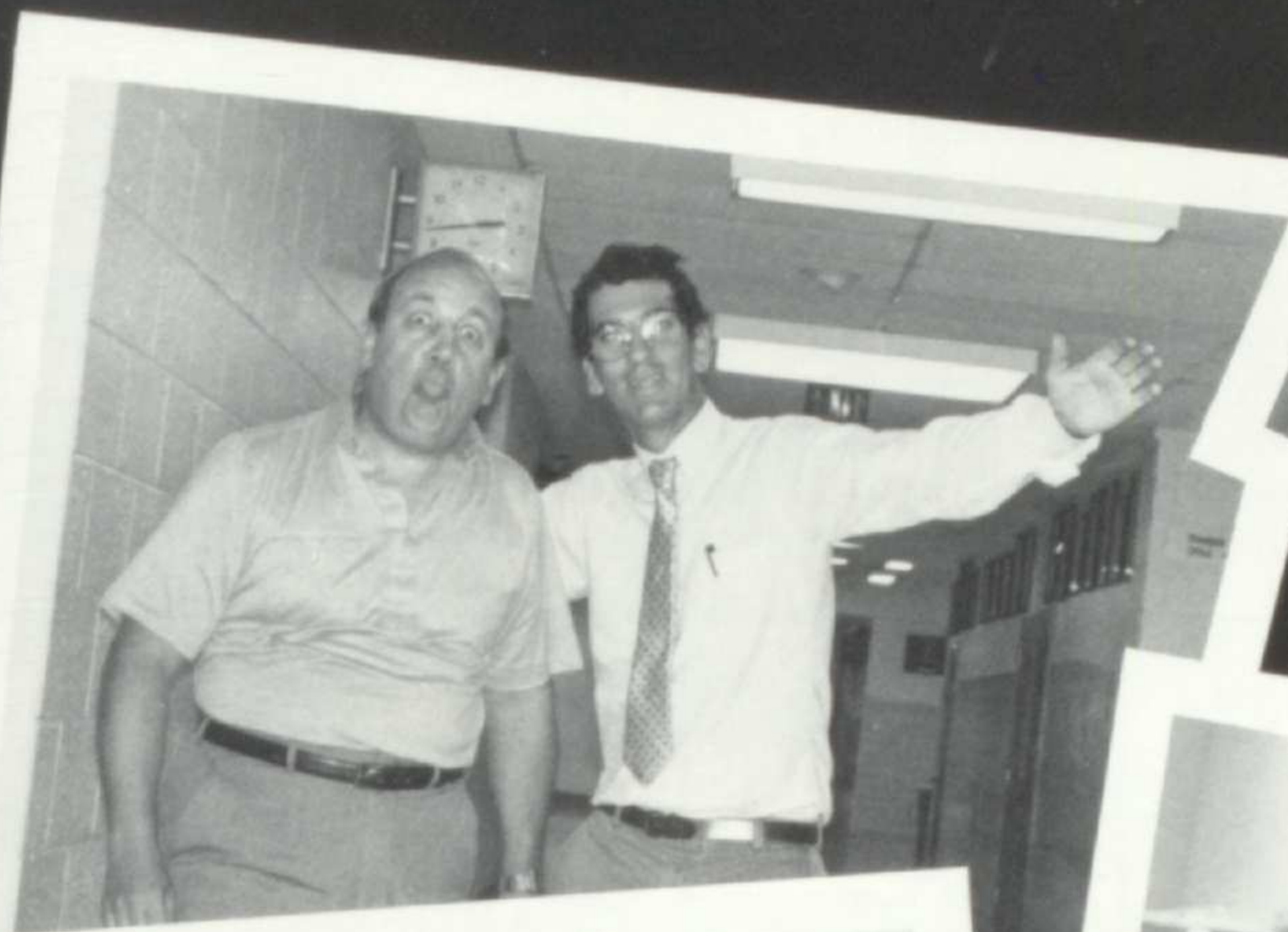

TEN YEARS OF CHANGE

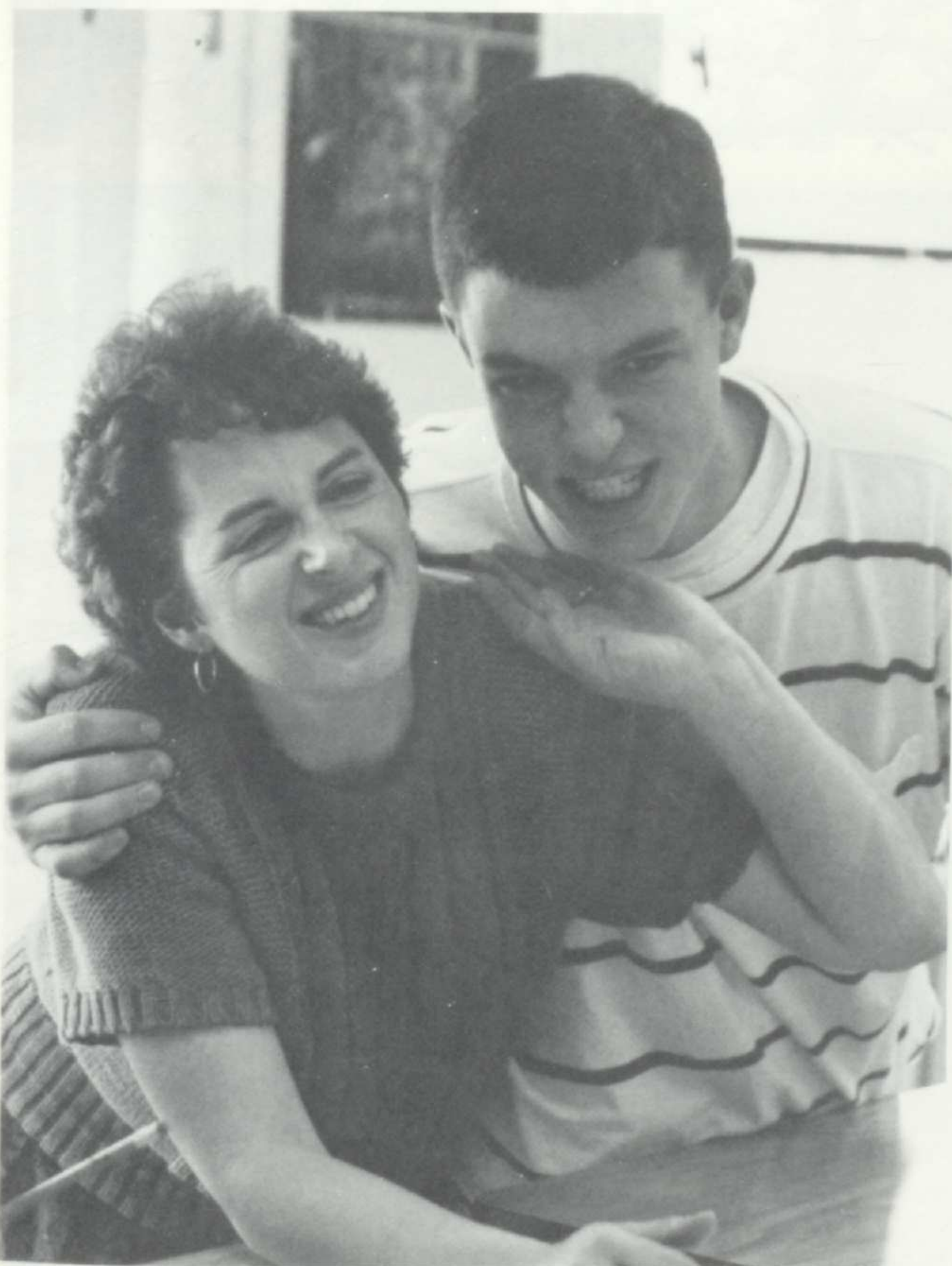

HELPING STUDENTS SUCCEED

In an attempt to meet the needs of the changing student population, the Board of Education funded a pilot program for freshmen and sophomore students who said they wanted more success in school than they had enjoyed in the past. The program entitled Guided Studies for Success became the brainchild of Assistant Principal Jim McElligot who recruited six teachers to participate: Ms. Conway, Mr. Miller, Mrs. Snyder, Mr. Geheardt, Mr. Butler, and Mr. Pollack.

The GSS classes met everyday with these teachers who not only introduced the students to the facilities and routines of the high school and main campus programs but also set expectations for behavior and achievement. Students learned study skills,

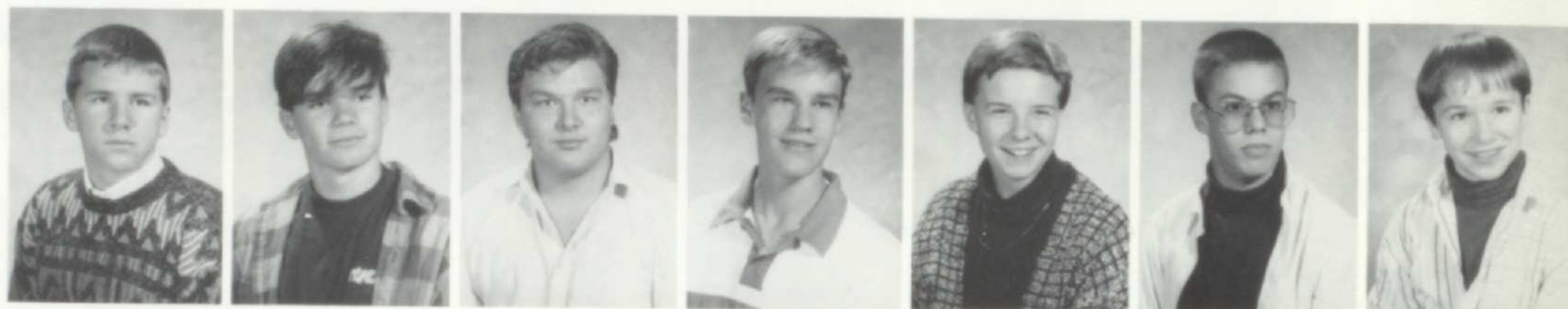
Freshmen Excel in Music

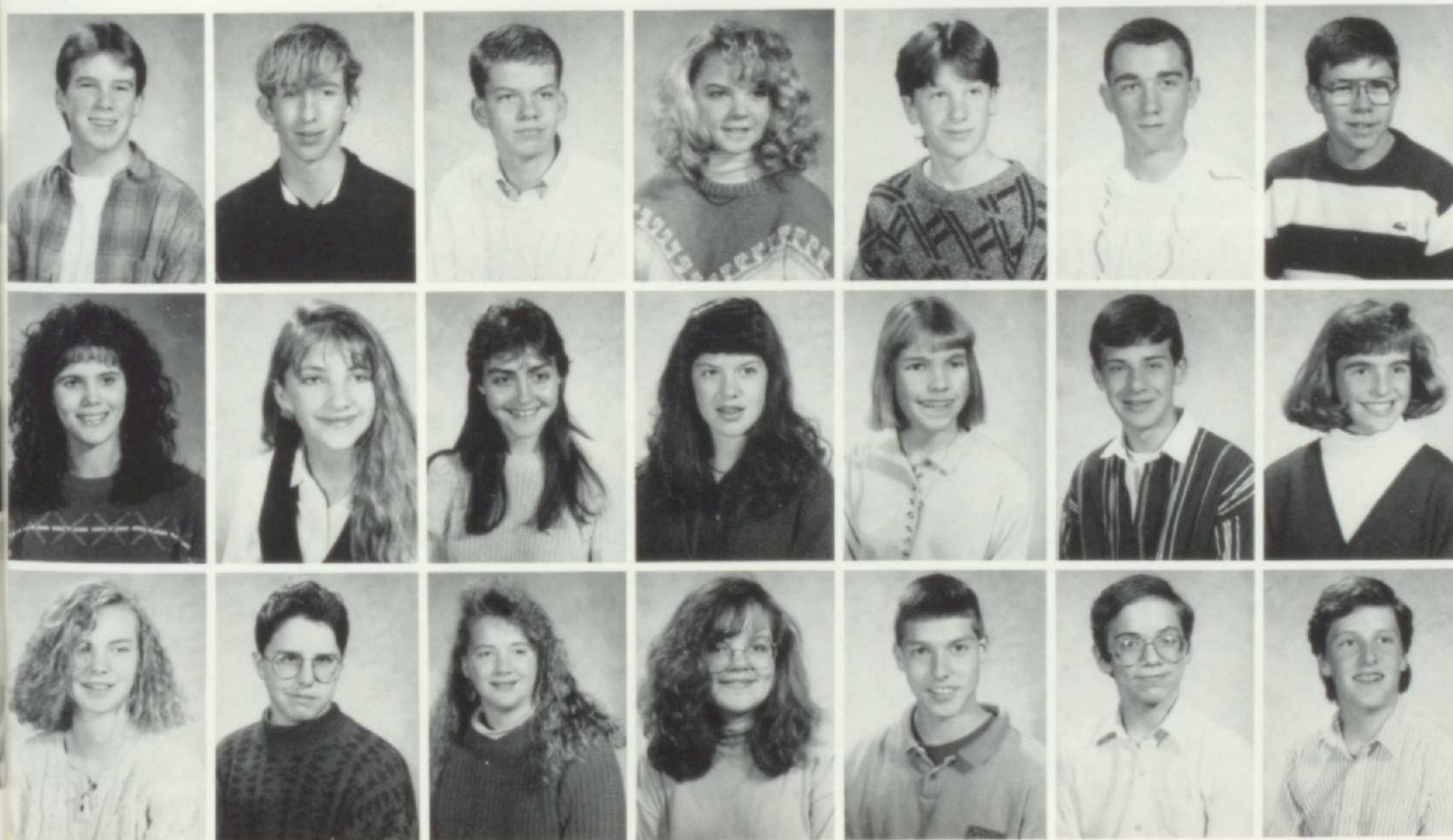
success.

LINWORTH: A CHANGE FROM MAIN CAMPUS

In keeping with its tradition of excellence, Worthington High School provides a program of alternative education in addition to the more conventional system offered at the Main High School Campus and the Kilbourne Campus.

The Alternative Program answers the needs of up to 150 9th - 12th graders who prefer a smaller, more informal school setting, a less structured approach to learning, and more direct control over their own education. A.P. students move beyond the realm of traditional education to pursue individual interests and to participate in the design of their own schedules.

Students describe the A.P. as a place offering friendship and a sense of belonging. They may elect to work with teacher - advisors to write learning agreements which describe the students' educational goals, objectives, methods, and evaluations. They may also choose "interim" which is a period of one or two weeks of intensive study ap-

proved by a teacher for credit inside or outside school.

The Alternative Program also offers a walkabout program to second semester seniors who choose to use all or a portion of the semester to explore career opportunities or college programs or to test their abilities as adults with adults in business and professional settings. This experience may allow students to earn college credit or may serve to confirm or negate students' interests in particular fields.

Once a week the A.P. holds weekly meetings with the entire school. Dealing with the operation of the school, finding solutions to the problems which arise, and creating a sense of pride and family within the school are the goals of these town meetings.

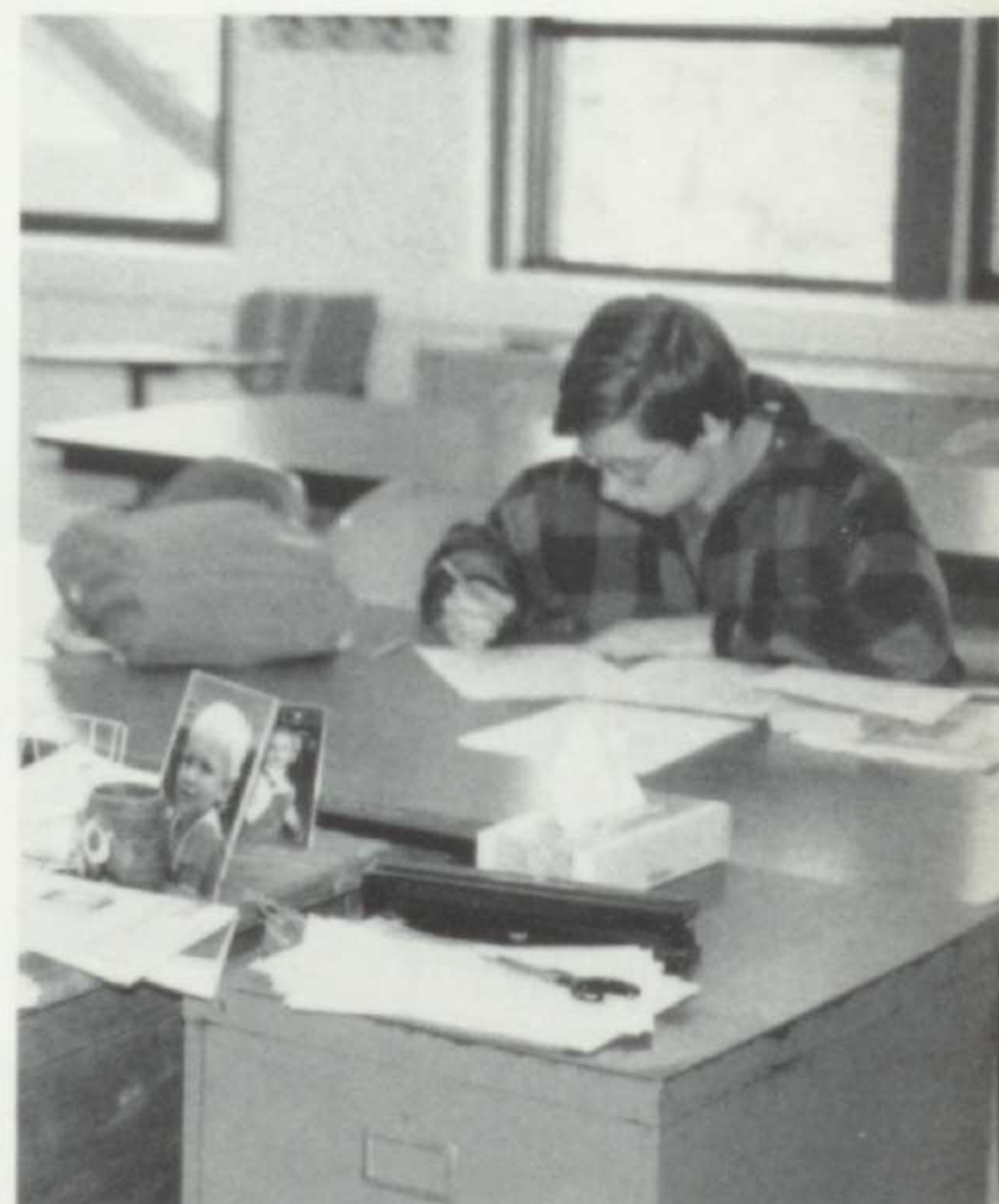

Rob Mottice claims that beating Mike Anderson at euchre in study hall, along with dating Dave Hughes' mom, were a couple of his most memorable events throughout high

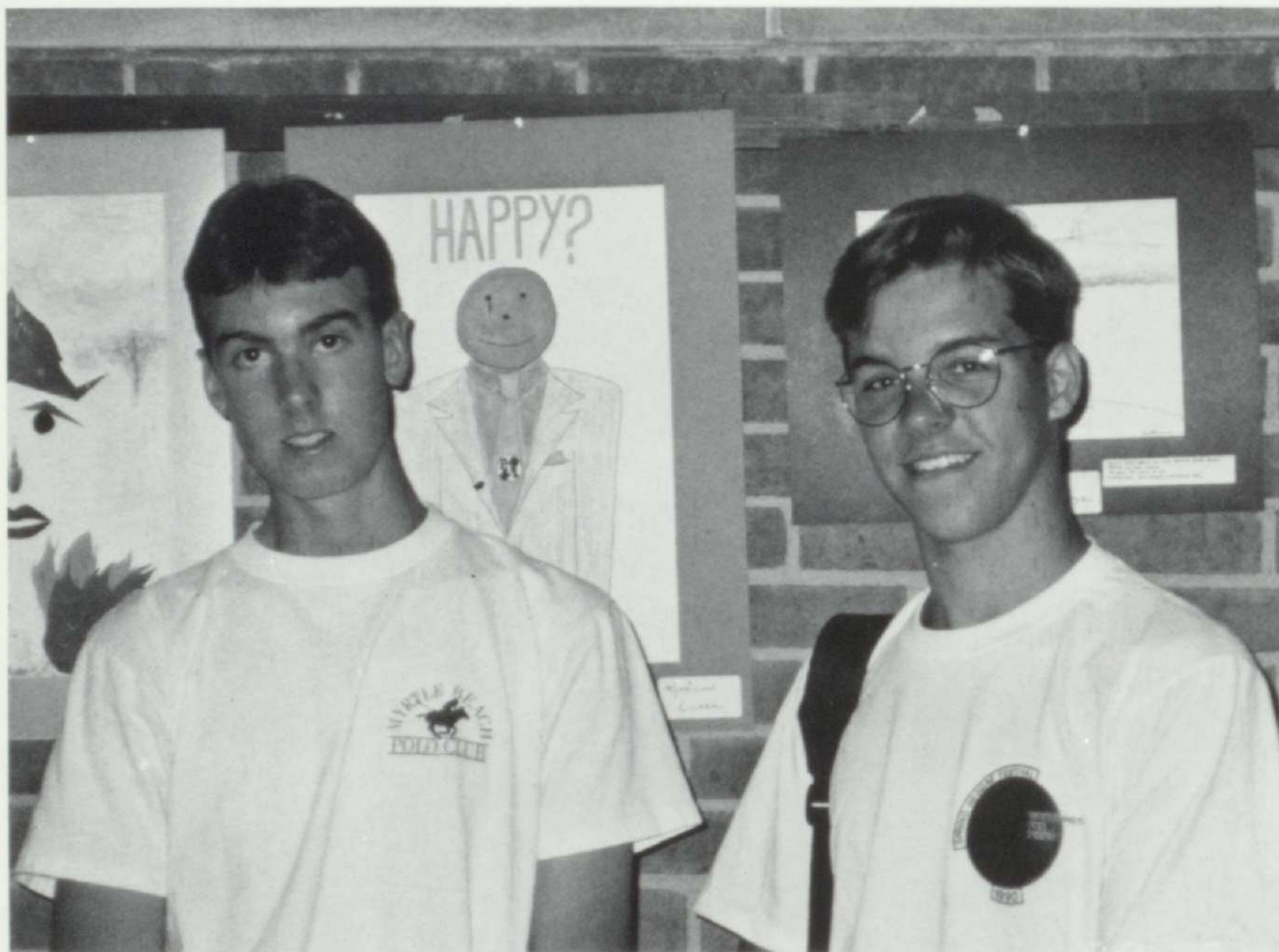

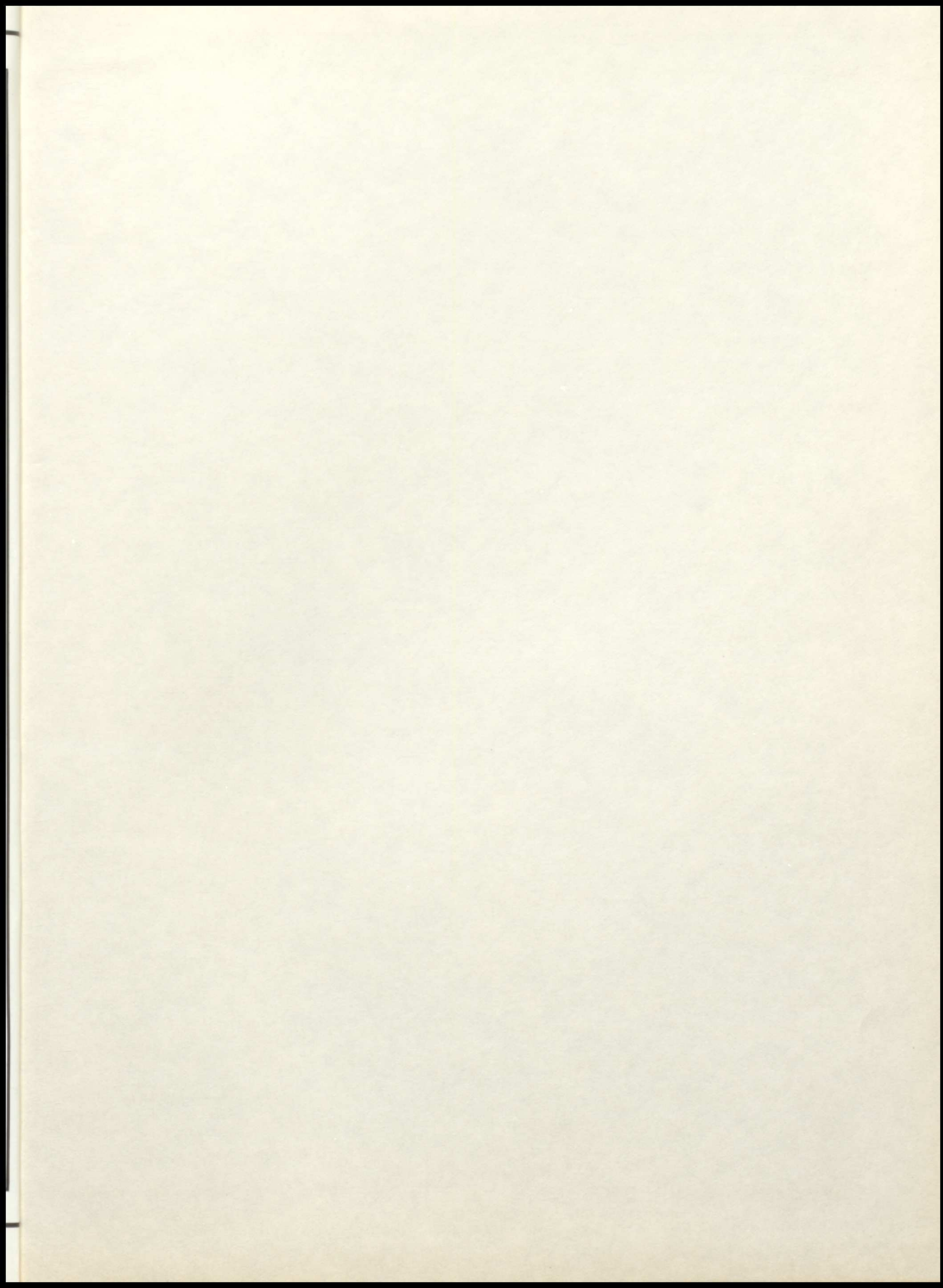
