

Congressman Bob McEwen will serve as the featured speaker at the annual Community Prayer Breakfast held in conjunction with the Family Festival for the past five years. His topic is "Staying in Tune with Prayer."

A powerful and interesting speaker, Bob McEwen is a member of the House of Representatives' Prayer Group which meets every Wednesday morning. He is also a member of the committee which sponsors the National Prayer Breakfast. The Canadian Parliament chose him to address its National Prayer Breakfast.

Representing Ohio's 6th Congressional District in the U.S. House of Representatives, Bob McEwen was first elected to Congress in 1980. He serves on the Veterans Affairs Committee and committees or task forces concerning such key issues as economic policy, national intelligence, human rights, high technology and agriculture.

McEwen is a lifelong resident of Hillsboro, Ohio, where he and his wife Liz have four sons. Active in community affairs, he is a member of Rotary International, Jaycees, Kiwanis and the Optimist Club. He serves on the board of elders of the Hillsboro Christian Church and is a member of the Hillsboro Chamber of Commerce.



The United States Army Field Band and Soldiers' Chorus in Concert

Saturday, May 17, 7:30 to 9:30 p.m. Worthington High School Main Campus Auditorium Free concert, admission by ticket only.

A highlight of the Family Festival will be the performance of the United States Army Field Band and Soldiers' Chorus. The band, which received top reviews for its performance a year ago in Worthington to a capacity-filled auditorium, is often referred to as the "Musical Ambassadors of the Army."

For this special family concert, the band will perform a patriotic prologue, Sousa's "Liberty Bell March," selections from the "Sound of Music" and some light classical numbers. Also included will be "Gershwin Memories" and Sousa's "Stars and Stripes Forever." The chorus will perform a patriotic medley entitled "Celebrate America."

The Field Band, under the direction of Colonel William E. Clark, is composed of the Army's finest musicians. Many have studied at the country's leading conservatories and schools of music. Others have performed with major symphonies and leading dance orchestras before entering the service. The Soldiers' Chorus, the vocal counterpart of the band, is composed of 29 highly trained vocalists. Major Frank G. Duby directs this group of talented musicians.

The concert is free, but admission is by ticket only. Tickets may be obtained at the following locations: Worthington AAA Auto Club, 90 E. Wilson Bridge Rd.; Worthington Community Center, 360 Highland Ave.; and the Worthington School District Administrative Offices, 752 High St.


Alyson Butterfield, Grade 3


